and used jointly between the M. E. and Baptist people, prior to organization at Liberty.

When the work was organized Rev. B. H. Lewis became pastor and served the church for five years, rendering gratuitous service.

In 1874 the church joined the Grande Ronde association at Wingville, and the following year the association met with this church at the Ladd Canyon school house. Thirty delegates and visitors were entertained in four homes of the church.

In 1878 Deacon John Perkins and family united with the church, adding greatly to the force. From 1878 till 1884 the church was pastorless, but held regular monthly meetings, mainly in the home of Deacon Perkins. In 1883 the association met again with the church, and by courtesy of the Methodist people, used their house of worship. In May, 1884, Rev. George T. Ellis became pastor. The church then had 20 members, and settled Pastor Ellis on a \$900 salary. From this date the body grew in members and strength. In a short time the building impulse came on, and within a few months the "new church," the pride and rejoicing of a happy people, was dedicated, costing \$2,800. In this new home the church grew rapidly. "Grandpa" Miller, of May Park, now in his 87th year, was the contractor and builder. During the early pastorate of Mr. Ellis, the name of the church was changed to "The First Baptist Church, La Grande." In January, 1889, Pastor Ellis held a great meeting, being assisted by Revs. Wheeler and Burchet. Thirty members were added. Pastor Ellis closed his work in May, 1890.

Rev. A. LeRoy became pastor in 1890, and served two years. Rev. Charles A. Rice succeeded and was pastor for two years. Rice was succeeded by Rev. E. A. Leonard, who served the church one year. Rev. C. A. Salyer was pastor for nine months in 1897. During a pastorless interim, August to December, 1897, the present building site was purchased, and the church edifice was moved from South La Grande to the new town. Pastor T. S. Dulin entered upon his work and wrought well for two years, 1898-1899. Then followed Rev. C. R. Lamar, who labored two years, to be succeeded by Rev. Carrol Gent, who stayed one year. Gent was succeeded by Rev. G. W. Silk, and he by Rev. J. F. Day; who remained one year each. These brethren served the church in times of financial depression, and her life was of changing character, first ebbing, then flowing. Discouragements were many and fortune fickle. At one of the darkest hours in her life, October 1, 1905, Pastor W. H. Gibson was called and entered upon his labors. Soon thereafter plans for improving the old structure were set on foot. About that date, November 1905, Dr. Brougher visited our city and at the pastor's suggestion, he preached an inspirational sermon, the theme being, "Doing the Impossible." In this sermon the fire was kindled into the flame of zeal which has produced this new edifice.

Following this a pastorate of two years was held in Downey, Cal. Here another building enterprise was put through. Thence he was called to Aberdeen, Wash., where he resided three years, and built the present commodious church edifice in that city. Then followed four years in Puyallup, Wash., where he was pastor of the First Baptist church.

October, 1905, he entered upon his labors in this city, where his persistent energy and persevering spirit have been in evidence since.

Another Prominent Man.
Rev. Thomas Spurgeon Fretz, who is here to aid in special meetings, is a man of sweet and tender spirit. For several years he has been doing evangelistic work on the chapel car "Good Will." His personality and labors so impressed the American Baptist Publication society, that they laid hold on him, gave him a church on wheels at a cost of \$8,000, and sent him out to do work for God and humanity. He comes to us to tell the same good news that has cheered and blessed other cities and destitute regions.

Other Words on the Event.
The Observer would register the

city's appreciation of the pioneers who began the work here, so graciously consummated by their sons and successors. They all, save one, have gone—their works remain. The Lewises are here. The Dicks are in Portland. The others are promoted. Then a word of appreciation for the present membership. Like beavers they have wrought while others slept. The membership locally is about 70, poor in coin but rich in faith. They have wrought well. But this other thing remains to be said. But for the liberal help of the citizenship of this city these things were not possible.
