The Magazines for April.
Everybody's—The New Mississippi; the Islands of the Blest, a story by Justus Miles Forman; Thought; The Racing Game; Wet Lilies, a story; Paris and the Parisites; The Shadow World, a Realistic Account of Occult Phenomena, by Hamilton Garland; Governor Johnson—New Style Politician; A Man of No Imagination, a story by Owen Johnson; The Man as Well, a story by Richard Washburn Child; The Bell Rat, a story; The Players; The Guest of Quesnay, Booth Tarkington's serial; Little Stories of Real Life, two in a number; A Gentleman Farmer and The Vampire of the Slums; and the usual departments, Straight Talk, Under the Spreading Chestnut Tree and With Everybody's Publishers. Hamilton Garland's narration of his experiments in the realm of occult will probably be read by more people than any other number in the April Everybody's.

Munsey's is more than usually interesting, especially to those who are interested in the year's political aspects and in the probable chances of various "favorite sons," who are in turn eager to appear in public print during these troublous times. There is an account of "Famous Speeches at National Conventions"; a two-page laudation of Senator Albert J. Beveridge; the serial, Barry Gordon; Cannon, Fairbanks, Hughes, Taft, Cortelyou, Foraker, Folk, Johnson and Bryan in caricature; several good short stories, and the usual departments devoted to the stage, etc.

McClure's contains but one political article, a study of Hughes, New York's governor and a presidential aspirant. The South After the War by Carl Shurz, is illustrated by photographs. There are several short stories of excellence; Mary Baker G. Eddy occupies several pages, as she has done for some months; Ellen Terry's stage experiences are continued, and Hugo Munsterberg has contributed another psychobiological and sociological article, "The Prevention of Crime." McClure's does not devote so much space to editorial matters as do some of the other magazines, and is contented this month to reprint a commendation, by the Boston Herald, of "One Man and His Town," first appearing in the January magazine.

Contrary to one's probable expectations, the American deals not with things or men political, and gives us only "The Powers of a Strenuous President." There are two real poems, and besides Ray Stannard Baker's discussion of the negro problem, this month the "Tragedy of the Mutilato,"—there is "Mr. Dooley on the Temperance Wave," Lincoln Steffens tells us about William J. Burns in "The Keenest of Detectives, and the Story of His Hardest Job." Some good short stories and the editorial pages complete the number.
