U'REN MEETS MANY VOTERS

Considering the counter attractions, and being Saturday night when the business houses keep open until a late hour, there was a good attendance out to hear Hon. W. S. U'Ren at the Commercial club, there being no less than 200 out to hear him.

County Chairman C. E. Cochran presided at the meeting, and invited all of the legislative candidates present to take seats on the platform, including Turner Oliver, the democratic nominee for joint senator.

Preliminary to the address of Mr. U'Ren, the chairman called for a few brief remarks from each of the representative candidates. J. P. Ruak, candidate for joint representative for Union and Wallowa counties, led out, and realizing that those who were in attendance were there for the purpose of hearing the speaker for the occasion, as also did the others, he only attempted to set forth the fact that he was, and always had been a staunch supporter of statement No. 1.

R. D. Hamilton, candidate for county representative, stated that six years ago he came out in print as favoring the election of United States senators by a direct vote and upon becoming a candidate at this time he deemed it a duty and a pleasure to subscribe to statement No. 1.

Turner, Oliver, stated that he came there, not to talk, but to listen; that he always had been in favor of a direct vote and that it was a great day in Oregon when the selection of United States senators was taken off of the auction block. Later in the campaign Mr. Oliver stated that he might have something to say.

S. F. Richardson being the next called upon, said that this was unexpected, but that while in the legislature years ago that the voting for senators by a direct vote was one of his hobbies and still was.

J. B. Stoddard, the last candidate to speak, stated that all being in favor of statement No. 1, that that question was settled, and that had he time he would discuss such matters as shipping and water rights, both of which are live questions for this county.

U'Ren was then introduced, and spoke for more than an hour on statement No. 1. He led out by stating that upon five different occasions the lower house of congress which is elected direct, had passed a resolution favoring the election of United States senators by a direct vote, but when this same resolution reached the United States senate, it never got before that body, but was killed in the

committee. He reviewed the result of our legislative experience in the election of United States senators, which was the well known basis that finally produced our present primary law and it was evident that the people are determined not to go back to the former system, as Mr. U'Ren designates it, "the auction block system."

The speaker also spoke in favor of Woman Suffrage. He did not claim the change would eradicate all of the evils of our body politic, but he did believe that women, as a rule, were more conscientious.

He also made a strong plea for the people to stand for the appropriation for the State university; that owing to the fact that Oregon had taken advanced steps towards popular legislation, that in order for the masses of our people to fulfill these increased responsibilities, that we must educate them and he not only pleaded for the university, but for the highest possible standard of our public schools.

He next took up the recall measure and favored that, believing, however, that after its enactment we would have few occasions to use it.

Mr. U'Ren has spent many years in laboring for reformatory laws and has in a large measure, been successful. He spoke for over two hours. A number from the valley were in attendance.
