tate Raffroad Commission Ends Remarkable Session-All Points in Oregon East of The Dalles Get 25

Per Cent Reduction on First-Class Freight-Rates Cut From One-Sixth to One-Tenth on First-Class Matter -Other Rates Accordingly.

Salem, March 31 .- (Bulletin.) - The state railroad commission today ended the most important session in its existence, cutting freight rates in Oregon from one-sixth to one-tenth of the present first-class rates. All other freight rates are cut accordingly.

The basis of the decision is that all rates from Portland to points in eastern Oregon, east of The Dalles, shall be reduced a portion of the excess above the rate from Portland to The Dalles, which is 25 per cent on first-
