M. D. Wisdom of Portland, secretary of the Oregon-Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition commission, is compiling a booklet on the resources of Oregon, which is to be distributed at the exposition in Seattle, in 1909. This booklet will be printed on good paper and well illustrated with Oregon scenery. Besides this it will contain a write-up of the state's resources and each county will be given a special notice. The commission is figuring on publishing 300,000 copies at a cost of \$10,000. These will be distributed from the publicity bureau in the Oregon building.

Oregon will make a collective exhibit at the Seattle fair in 1909. This will be the first time an exhibit of this kind has ever been made in the state. All exhibits will be installed in the Oregon building, which is now being erected in Seattle, and in the opinion of the commissioners, this is the best way to exhibit the resources of this state. Every portion of the state will be represented, and it is the desire of the commissioners to cooperate with those who wish to assist in bringing together a representative exhibit of the state's resources.

### THE SECOND AMENDMENT

#### Deals With the Location of State Institutions.

Following is the second of the amendments up for vote at the June election:

Referred by Legislative Assembly, No. 2.

For an amendment of section 3 of article XIV of the constitution, to permit the location of state institutions elsewhere than at the seat of government by act of the legislature and vote of the people. Vote yes or no.  
302. Yes.  
303. No.

Be it resolved by the senate, the house of representatives concurring:

That section 3 of article XIV of the constitution of the state of Oregon be amended to read as follows:

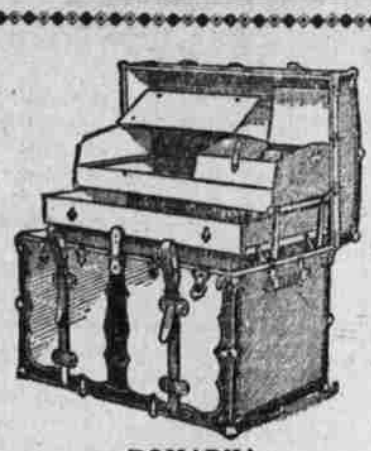
Section 3. The seat of government, when established as provided in section 1, shall not be removed for a term of 20 years from the time of such establishment, nor in any other manner than as provided in the first section of this article. All the public institutions of the state, not located elsewhere prior to January 1, 1907, shall be located in the county where the seat of government is, excepting when otherwise ordered by an act of the legislative assembly and is ratified by the electors of the state at the next general election following such act, by a majority of all the votes cast on the question of whether or not such act shall be ratified.

Empowered with special authority from the city council and provided with a screened wagon and a sure roping arm, Deputy Policeman James Peppers starts out tomorrow morning after dogs. ## RE-NAME THE CITY STREETS

In accordance with the request of the postal department, the council has taken up the matter of renaming some of the streets in this city that they may comply with the requirements of the rules governing free mail delivery. The council at its meeting last evening passed the following resolution, which will remedy these faults and will also eliminate several superfluous street names which are much better named as they will be when the resolution becomes an ordinance, than under the present confusing system:

La Grande, Ore., April 1, 1908.

To the Mayor and the Common Council of the City of La Grande.

Gentlemen: In a communication or file in the recorder's office from the United States postoffice inspector, we find that he suggests that certain streets be renamed, therefore, be it Resolved, That Q street be changed to Spruce street; Park street to Washington avenue; and that all streets running east and west, or tending in that direction be called avenues and those running north and south be called streets; also, that the name of Tyler avenue, as given to the street running east and west of block J, Grandy's addition, by the inspector, be adopted as the name of said street.

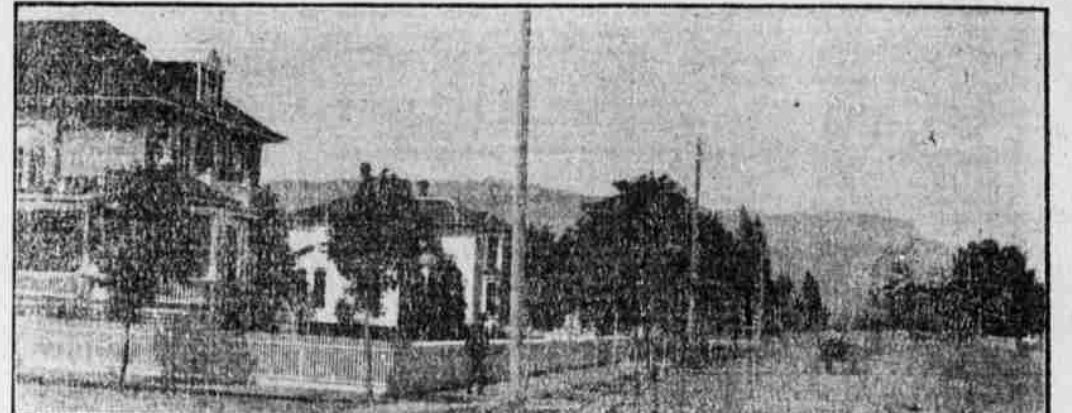
