BASEBALL AT BAKER CITY

Baker City, April 3.—The Herald said last night:
It is now practically settled that Baker City, Welser, La Grande and Pendleton will play ball the coming season. Col. W. F. Butcher and Chas. Hoiler are acting as a financial committee gathering in funds to start Baker's end of the league deal, and there is no doubt about them being successful.

The plan is to have professional baseball during the summer and maintain what is known as class D league. All players will be salaried men and no man will be kept who fails to make good. The games will be under the rules of the national league and a franchise will be obtained from that organization.

It is necessary for Baker City to raise \$1500 to start the enterprise, after which it is thought the gate receipts will pay out. A lease has been obtained on the grounds used last year for a ball park and plans for a new grandstand have been drawn. It will be large and comfortable, fitted with protection nets.

With four games a week the league towns will fare very well for the national sport. The trains will run so that people living in any of the four towns may leave their home in the morning, attend a ball game, and return home the same evening.

This is something that will be a fine thing. It is thought for all the cities included in the league and Baker can be counted upon to do her part in the matter. A meeting will be held in La Grande Sunday where a representative from each of the towns named will meet and make further arrangements for organization.

CHALLENGE ISSUED.

Demanding the Saloon Men to Prove Their Authority.

Rev. R. W. Raymond, the new superintendent of the Seattle Anti-Saloon league, has issued a challenge of \$100 to the authors of a circular issued by liquor interests to prove the authority of their quotations from famous men reported to favor saloons. Mr. Raymond says:

"As regards the statement of famous Americans quoted in the circular, while some of them may be true, others of them should plainly be branded as lies, and in the best of good faith I personally offer \$100 if the author will give me accepted authorities wherein may be found the quotation attributed to Abraham Lincoln and the other men quoted."

AMENDMENT NO. 3.

Asks for Increased Number of Supreme Court Judges.

Referred to the people by the legislative assembly.

An amendment to article VII of the constitution by increasing the number of judges of the supreme court from three to five, until otherwise provided by law, and authorizing the legislative assembly to provide by appropriate legislation for the exercise by the circuit courts, of the probate jurisdiction theretofore exercised by the county courts, and for the transaction of county business by and before some appropriate body or tribunal.
