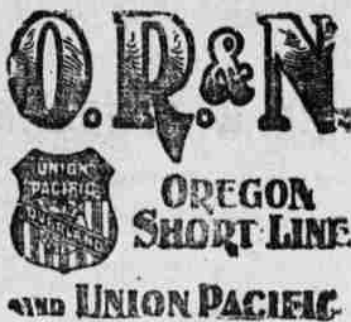

FACTS ABOUT J. H. HUNTER

The details of the disappearance of J. H. Hunter in Alaska some time ago, is made clear, as far as anyone knows, in a letter to Albert Hunter of Island City, from a lady of Sunrise, Alaska.

Mr. Hunter was known to a large number of La Grande people, and the following letter to Albert Hunter sets forth the details of the disappearance: Sunrise, Alaska, March 16, '08.

Albert Hunter,

Island City, Ore.

Dear Sir: I am in receipt of the sad news of the death of your kinsman, Mr. J. H. Hunter, and I will tell you as near as anyone knows, how it happened.

He was on his way from Kinick to Gerwood and traveling alone. When last seen he was going up the Crow creek summit. There was a man camped there and the wind and snowstorm caused the camper to ask Mr. Hunter to stop over with him, as the snow was drifting. Mr. Hunter was told he could not get over the mountains until the blizzard was over. But Mr. Hunter would not stay. About five days after that there were two men from here going to Kinick and they found Mr. Hunter's dog on the summit. The dog was almost starved, and there was no sign of the owner. There can be no doubt of Mr. Hunter being dead, for a young man could not live, lost in a windstorm in Alaska. They think he was blown off the top of the mountain into the canyon, several hundred feet deep, for there is no sign of him on the trail. In the spring his body may be found, but it is impossible to find him now. He told me he had a good quartz ledge located near Kinick, and as there has been some quartz found up there and there is a quartz mill going in there this spring, I wanted to advise you to find out for sure what he had, for it might pay well. But you can't trust everyone in Alaska to tell you.

GLADLY ACCEPT SCHOLARSHIP.

Son of Former President of University Chosen to Represent Oregon.

Wistar Johnson has been selected by the faculty of the university to receive the third Rhodes scholarship to Oxford from Oregon. He passed the examination successfully last year along with three other candidates, but was defeated in the final selection by Mr. Winans of Willamette university. At the spring commencement he was graduated, since when he has been attending the Boston Technical school, taking a course in mining engineering. As he was still eligible the faculty committee of the university, in that he was their choice last year, extended to him their support this year, and a letter has been received from him, accepting the appointment and stating that he will be in Eugene about July 1 to make final preparations for his departure.

Wistar is the youngest son of Professor Johnson, first president of the University of Oregon, and during his college career here he maintained a high average in scholarship besides being a very prominent athlete. His many friends here are more than pleased with his good fortune and are confident that he will be a creditable representative of his state and college. Oregon Weekly.

Amendment No. 4.

Referred to the People by the Legislative Assembly:

For amendment of section 14 of article II of the constitution, changing the time of holding the regular general biennial elections from the first Monday in June to the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November.

307. No.

Resolved by the House, the Senate concurring:

That the following amendment to the constitution of the state of Oregon be, and the same is hereby proposed:

Section 14 of Article II of the constitution of the state of Oregon shall be and hereby is amended to read as follows:

Section 15. The regular general biennial election in Oregon for the year 1910 and thereafter shall be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November. All officers except the governor, elected for a six-year term in 1904 or for a four-year term in 1906, or for a two-year term in 1908, shall continue to hold their respective offices until the first Monday in January, 1911; and all officers, except the governor, elected at any regular general biennial election after the adoption of this amendment, shall assume the duties of their respective offices on the first Monday in January following such election. All laws pertaining to the nomination of candidates, registration of voters and all other things incident to the holding of the regular biennial election shall be enforced and be effected the same number of days before the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November that they have heretofore been before the first Monday in June biennially, except as may hereafter be provided by law.
