# FUNERAL ON THURSDAY

The remains of Mrs. Jack Smith will reach La Grande tomorrow night according to a telegram to Mrs. Rankin, mother of the deceased, received last evening. The funeral will be held from the Presbyterian church Thursday afternoon at 2 o'clock, Rev. Van Nuys of Pendleton, officiating.

Mrs. Smith died at Phoenix, Ariz., last Saturday of consumption. Conductor Smith, who was with her at the time, started home immediately, and should reach here tomorrow night.

Mrs. Smith is the daughter of Mrs. Rankin, who lives in North La Grande, and has several relatives here. She has many friends here, who are grieved at her untimely death. For some time she has lived in Pendleton, where Conductor Smith made his headquarters while running on the Pendleton-Huntington run.

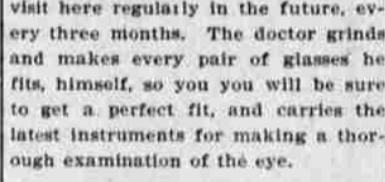
