PORTLAND NEWS LETTER

Portland, Ore., April 13.—(Special correspondence.)—Interest in community publicity reached a climax in Portland last week when the 80 prizes offered by the Portland Commercial club for articles on the Pacific northwest, printed in papers outside of Oregon and Washington, were awarded and the money distributed the same day. The judges were Messrs. James F. Ewing of Portland academy, J. P. Tyler, news editor of the Oregon Journal, and W. J. Cuddy, editor of the Weekly Oregonian, and they have spent two and one-half months reading the more than 1,000,000 words submitted by various contestants. Rev. John Roach Straton, pastor of the Seventh Baptist church of Baltimore, Md., was winner of the grand prize of \$1000. He was in Portland last summer for a short visit. Miss Mateel Howe of Portland, was awarded the second prize of \$500. Articles were in competition from every state in the union, and almost every state had its representative among the winners.

Charles S. Fee, passenger traffic manager of the Harriman lines, spent three full days in Portland last week in consultation with General Passenger Agent William McMurray and other officials, arranging the details of a 28-hour service between Portland and San Francisco.

When Senator George C. Perkins of California, in a speech recently delivered before the United States senate, made the statement that Portland harbor afforded a depth of between 12 and 20 feet, the people of the great Columbia River basin and all those of the Pacific northwest were astonished. The most thorough compilation of the shipping of 1907 from this port shows numerous vessels with draft ranging from 25 to 25.9 feet, and a very large number averaging in excess of 24 feet. The people of the Columbia River basin do not appreciate the misrepresentation constantly given the river, and have asked Senator Perkins to correct his erroneous statement in the senate, but up to this time he has not done so.

Mayor Helfeld, of Lewiston, came to Portland on the 10th at the head of a delegation of Lewiston-Clarkston citizens, including officials of the commercial bodies, the managers of their numerous irrigation projects, railroad officials and capitalists to personally invite representative citizens of Portland to visit Lewiston-Clarkston on May 1 to celebrate the opening of the "Ilparia cut-off," which means a 10-hour schedule between those cities and Portland.

"Were it not for the fact that representation makes it necessary for me to reside in the national capital," said F. J. Haskin, the famous foreign correspondent, representing some 40 of the leading metropolitan papers of the country, "I would choose the Pacific northwest for my home. In no section of the world is the reward of endeavor so sure, and life so wholesome and delightful. I have encountered the most delightful weather in Portland that I have seen during a trip of more than 20,000 miles since January 1."

Oregon Horses for Kentucky.

E. B. Eblin of Kentucky is now in Grant county trying to buy 8000 head of range horses for shipment to eastern markets, but so far has been unable to make any extensive purchases. He has bought 1000 head of aged horses from W. W. Brown of Paulina, Crook county, but he has been unable to make any further purchases on account of the low prices offered.

He has been on a deal for 4000 head of horses in the Lee district in Grant county, but the owners are holding for good prices and he will have to pay more than he offers if he gets them.

Mr. Eblin says that the demand for horses in the eastern and southern states is unprecedented and he will ship out every hoof he can buy in the northwest. He also says that the class of horses raised in Oregon has been greatly improved in the past few years and that it is now possible to find as good drivers, saddlers, roadsters and draft horses on the ranges of Oregon as anywhere in the world, while a few years ago the grade had been allowed to run down considerably.—Pendleton East Oregonian.
