DAIRYING AS A MONEYMAKER

That Union county is admirably adapted to profitable dairying as well as one of the leading alfalfa producers, potato culture, beet growing, the fruit industry and a large and varied line of other industries, is reflected in a yearly account kept by Willard Couch of Ladd Canyon, who devotes some of his time to dairying. This incident is only one of a dozen, and some of them would perhaps show a greater percentage of profit than this one.

A Good Report.

Mr. Couch reports that from 20 cows he realized \$1238 for butter fat in 12 months, exclusive of cheese made from the milk. To produce the feed and fodder for these 20 cows, it required but four months of hay feeding; the other eight months' feed was obtained on the pasture. No grain or bran feed was used at all during these 12 months.

Profitable Chicken Raising.

Not only content with dairying along scientific ways, Mr. Couch devotes considerable profitable time to the chicken industry. In 12 months just past the farmer realized \$188.20 from eggs, and \$71 from the sale of chickens to the meat markets. Twelve months ago Mr. Couch had 75 chickens and he still has that number. The cost of feeding the chickens is a trifling figure. The hens rustled their feed from the haystacks.

Through these two sources of revenue the farmer has entered on the desirable side of the ledger an item reading \$1495.20, while the ranch has been bringing in the usual revenues obtained from the ordinary Grande Ronde valley farms.

UNCOVER VALUABLE BOX.

Pendletonian Finds Long Lost Tin Box in City Limits.

Nearly 20 years ago a tin box containing \$1120 in gold coin was buried by J. B. Jacobs in the yard of his home near the Catholic church in this city, says the Pendleton Tribune.

Twenty-six years ago the greatest flood ever seen by white men in the Umatilla river, swept down the valley and inundated the then small town of Pendleton. When the waters receded Jacobs, who now lives on Tutuilla creek, was unable to find his cache of gold.

Wednesday of this week and while working for Jim Hastings, the house-mover, and employed in removing the old house from its location, Tom Johnson, a young laborer, found the box with the money in it.

At least it is the firm belief of the officers, Mr. Jacobs and others, that he found the box and the money, although he now denies it.

That night he proceeded to do the town as it had never been done before, buying 20 glasses of champagne at one time for his friends in the tenderloin district. Altogether he blew in \$250 that night, say the police, who have been looking the matter up.

While under the influence of liquor he boasted he had found a box containing \$1120 in gold.

The fact that the amount buried by Jacobs tallied with the amount he claimed to have found under the house and also that since that time he has been possessed of an unusual amount of money for one in his circumstances, leads to the general belief that he really found the wealth.

Johnson was placed under arrest by Marshal Gurdane Friday evening, and was released again. Yesterday Mr. Jacobs, through his attorney, J. Roy Raley, sought to have Johnson indicted, but Acting District Attorney Peterson refused to issue an indictment on the evidence furnished.

If it can be proven that Johnson found the money and converted it to his own use he will be guilty of larceny.

Had Close Call.

Bert Bohn, a fireman in the employ of the O. R. & N. here, met with an accident Sunday night whereby he may lose his eyesight. Mr. Bohn was getting ready to go on his run when he attempted to light the acetylene headlight of his engine in the yards, at the shops, last night about 11 o'clock, when he struck a match and opened the crystal to the headlight, and the accumulation of gas there exploded, burning Mr. Bohn's face, eyelashes and eyebrows. A physician was called who dressed the wounds and the man was taken to Portland this morning. It was not known whether the man's eyesight will be permanently injured or not.—The Dalles Chronicle.
