RULES REGARDING POSTCARDS.

Regulations That Postcard Lovers Should Follow Closely.

The La Grande postoffice department is constantly meeting with trouble from those who send postal cards. The following advice should be ob-

Dat

Postal cards must bear at the head of the front the title "Postal Card" or its equivalent. They must be made of cardboard or thick paper, and "must not be inclosed in an envelope." Private postal cards need not bear that title. Postage stamps should be placed in the upper right hand corner of the address side. The right hand half of the address side is reserved for the address, postmarks. etc.; the left-hand half may be used to contain a message or a picture on very thin paper, may be pasted there; also a label not exceeding two inches by three-quarters of an inch in size may be pasted there. On the back of the card a picture on very thin paper may be pasted. With the exception of postage stamps, the labels and the pictures on very thin paper mentioned above, nothing may be attached to a postal card.

Postal cards (so-called), consisting of wood, leather or any material other than paper or cardboard, are subject to treatment as letters.




