The campaign is practically closed. Tomorrow at noon the battle of the ballots begins. This is considered one of the most difficult campaigns ever held in the county to forecast. There may be not a few surprises. Political leaders who generally can see which way the political straws are drifting, are apparently at sea. It will be an easy matter to say after the votes are counted, "I told you so," but there are very few who are making forecasts with any degree of assurance. The valley vote is the unknown quantity. The farmers have all been busy putting in their crops and have been talking very little politics and are extremely cautious in expressing their preferences. Early in the campaign statement No. 1 started out to become quite an issue, but good judgment prevailed and all of the candidates came out in favor of it, and since then the campaign has dragged along in a kind of listless way, as far as enthusiasm is concerned. There is no question but what the great majority of the voters have fixed in their minds whom they are going to vote for, but as in most of the instances there are good men running for office, and they can vote for only one, so they are simply keeping quiet, and there will be few scoops until after the votes are counted.

This is La Grande's year to celebrate the Fourth of July and it is the intention of the business men to take advantage of the opportunity to celebrate in a style which will cause the rest of eastern Oregon to "set up and take notice." In years past La Grande has celebrated the nation's natal day in a fitting style, but this year plans will be made to eclipse all former efforts. All the towns in the valley will be asked to participate and assist in making the 1908 celebration a truly grand affair, and one which will establish a record for future efforts. La Grande is going to celebrate.
