**O. R. & N. OFFICIALS INDICTED FOR VIOLATING 14-HOUR LAW**

**GENERAL SUPERINTENDENT M. J. BUCKLEY IS INDICTED BY A PENDLETON ATTORNEY**

**HELD TRAIN CREW ON ROAD FOR SEVENTEEN HOURS**

Thursday afternoon District Attorney G. W. Phelps of Pendleton, filed a criminal information against J. M. Buckley, general superintendent of the O. R. & N. company, charging him with violation of the 14-hour law and the railroad official will have to plead to the same before Circuit Judge H. J. Bean, says the Pendleton East Oregonian.

In several ways the indictment filed against Mr. Buckley is one of interest. It is the first criminal action ever brought under the 14-hour law that was passed at the last session of the legislature. Incidentally it will probably be the last one for the recently enacted federal law, making 16 hours the maximum time railroad men may be kept at work, supersedes the state law.

However, the federal law did not go into effect until March 4, and as the offense with which the railroad company is now accused occurred in October, the general superintendent is subject to prosecution under the state law. Henceforth violations will be prosecuted by the federal courts.

In the information filed today, M. J. Buckley and John Doe, the latter being the train dispatcher at The Dalles, who was then on duty, are both charged with violating the law on October 13, 1907. The railroad

record for that day shows that freight train No. 22 bound from The Dalles to Umatilla, was upon the run for a period of 17 hours and five minutes.

The case was referred to Mr. Phelps by the railroad commission, who asked that it be prosecuted. Accordingly an investigation was made by the district attorney, in the course of which he took testimony from J. P. O'Brien, general manager, Mr. Buckley and others. No reasonable excuse for the delay was offered by the railroad people and it is believed that a plea of guilty will be made when the case comes up in court.

At the same time the above case was given to Mr. Phelps two other charges were also filed with him. However, the offenses occurred in the other judicial district so no action has been taken by Mr. Phelps.

Under the state law the penalty for violating the 14-hour law varies from a fine of from \$100 to \$500, imprisonment in the county jail from six months to one year, or both.

It is very probable that the facts in the present case will be stipulated and passed up to Judge Bean without a trial. Since October the dispatcher then on duty at The Dalles has resigned and his present whereabouts are not known.

**HOBSON TO PENDLETON.**

Hero of the Merrimac May Speak in Pendleton Soon.

If it is possible to secure him for a lecture in this city, Congressman Richmond P. Hobson will be brought here at a later date this spring, says a Pendleton paper. If he cannot be secured, a substitute will be brought here to fill his appointment or else the money collected for the Hobson lecture will be refunded by the high school.

This announcement was made today by Superintendent J. S. Landers and Principal Hampton of the high school. Mr. Landers has already written the Merrimac hero, laying the facts of the case before him and asking him if he can come here at a later date, the time being left to the speaker.

According to the high school people they regret deeply that Hobson was not here at the time set for him, but the fault was with the lecture bureau manager and not with the local people. The latter acted entirely in good faith in selling tickets for the entire course, of which the Hobson lecture was one of the five.

Since the first of the week Supt. Landers has been trying in vain to communicate with the lecture bureau manager, who seemingly has dropped out of sight.
