**IDAHO FRUIT PROSPECTS.**

Spraying and Attempting to Get a Good, Clean Crop This Year.

The Boise-Payette Fruitgrowers' union, which was organized here a short time ago, is doing a great deal of active work toward having an exceptional clean fruit crop this season and this week received a cartload of arsenic of lead for spraying purposes. This spray is for the especial purpose of killing the codlin moth and will be sold to the consumer at less than the average wholesale price, the rate being about 25 cents for 50 gallons of spray, which is less than half the price heretofore paid, says the Boise Capital News.

The fruit crop, as near as can be estimated at this time, promises a heavy yield this season, and the fruitgrowers will spare no pains in having the best quality of fruit that it is possible to raise. An informal meeting of a number of the members of the board was held yesterday afternoon in the chambers of the Commercial club, those present being Judge Wood, Charles Payne of Parma, C. C. Elffe of Payette, and C. J. Sinsel. The question of boxes, crates, baskets and paper was discussed at some length and it was found that excellent quotations had been offered the union on the large amount of material which will be needed. The union, buying as a whole, is able to save a large percentage to the fruitgrower, both in prices and freight, and it is an assured fact that a greater profit will be realized from the fruit business than has heretofore been made.

**RIHORN GETS ONE YEAR.**

Former Pendleton Real Estate Man Sentenced for Bigamy.

W. P. Rihorn, arrested on a charge of bigamy in Portland a few days ago, pleaded guilty to the charge yesterday and was sentenced to serve a year in the Multnomah county jail for his offense. He married a Kentucky girl at North Yakima last Christmas, while yet the husband of another wife in Portland. When charged with the crime a few weeks ago he left Portland, but was soon captured at Tillamook and brought back for trial. The case was called for trial yesterday when Rihorn pleaded, guilty. Rihorn was formerly engaged in the real estate business in Pendleton, but left there two years ago for western Oregon.

**State Fair Grounds Improved.**

At a meeting of the Oregon state board of agriculture held in Salem April 7, many improvements were ordered, the most important of which was the building of an additional grandstand room. An addition will be built on the east side of the present grandstand, carrying the seats out to the edge of the track, making the new addition 30x260 feet. A new fence was ordered built around the inside of the track; more entrance room will be provided at the main entrance, and several other minor improvements will be made. Work on the track will be started at once and it will be kept in first-class condition all season. Professor McElroy will furnish the music for the fair again this fall, he having given entire satisfaction heretofore. The score card privilege was let to R. J. Hendricks for \$350. Everything indicates that the 1908 fair will be still larger than any previous fair. The premium list is in the hands of the printer and will carry a larger offering of prizes than last year.

**Railroad Paid.**

The Great Northern Railroad company paid the Frost-Cope Lumber company \$16,000 yesterday in Judge Miles Poindexter's division of the superior court for loss sustained when the company did not supply cars sufficient to haul its logs during 1906, the settlement being made after a suit for \$25,000 had been going forward for four days.
