ELECTRIC TO WALLOWA CO.

Cheering news is brought from Walla Walla about the proposed electric railway from that city into Walla Walla county, by George S. Craig, who has just returned from there, where he attended the graduating recital of his daughter, Miss Joyce, at Whitman College Conservatory of Music. Mr. Craig is convinced the Walla Walla people mean business. In an interview with the News-Record of Enterprise, he said:

"I was much surprised at the things being done by Walla Walla capitalists in the matter of the electric line we have been frequently hearing about. It can be said with certainty that they have thoroughly investigated and surveyed a route from Walla Walla to the Grande Ronde river at or near the mouth of the Little Salmon. People of Walla Walla are very anxious for the road to be continued on to Enterprise and I found that they stand ready to assist in a substantial manner in the continuation of the line from the Grande Ronde river to this city. They already know about the population of the north end of the county, and the fertility of the soil in all parts of the county, and have evidently figured out that besides tapping a big timber belt they can no doubt do a good business in freight and passenger traffic between the north end of the county and Enterprise. If the people of Enterprise will show one-half as much enthusiasm in the matter as is shown in Walla Walla, we can expect something to be doing. Much of my information I received on my trip is confidential and I am not at liberty to make it public at this time. I will say this much, however, that now is the time for us to get busy."

STATE WASTING THOUSANDS.

Armory Appropriation Bill Would Save Much Money in the End.

Portland, Ore., April 20.—(Special.)—"Does it pay to have a landlord?" That world-old question of economy is being asked by Oregon National guardsmen all over the state. Answer that question and you have expressed your views on the armory bill which is to be voted on at the June election, they say.

"Under the present arrangement the state is in the position of a man who has another's roof over his head," said Adjutant General W. E. Finzer, in an interview today on the subject of the armory bill. The state not only suffers all the inconveniences of being a tenant, but is also paying out thousands of dollars in rent that should be going into substantial structures.

"Leaving aside the patriotic motives which should cause every voter to lend all support possible to the National Guard, now a line of national defense, the economic aspect of the armory bill should carry it at the June election alone. At present Oregon has rented armories for local companies at such points as Salem, Albany, Roseburg, Pendleton, Baker City, Eugene and six other cities. These armories are not suitable for the purpose to which they are put and they cost the state exactly \$5000 per year.

"The armory bill appropriates \$25,000 per year for four years for the building of 12 armories. Thus the total appropriation is \$100,000. It doesn't take much figuring to show that in a few years the state would be ahead on the deal and that the armory bill, instead of being an expensive necessity, is a good investment for the taxpayers who have the future welfare of the state at heart."
