DEAL JURY IS DRAWN

Pendleton, April 21.—The Pendleton East Oregonian said last night:

R. W. Deal, one of the oldest pioneers of Union county, and for 40 years a prominent horseman of the inland empire, is on trial in the circuit court in this city today for the theft of a horse, the case having come here on a change of venue from Union county.

About 20 witnesses, many of them among the most prominent pioneers of Grande Ronde valley, are attending the trial and it is of more than usual importance owing to the prominence of the accused. Deal is a white-haired man of perhaps 60 years of age, is on trial for the second offense in the past few years in Union county.

In this case he is accused of having stolen a horse from E. L. Halley, a young farmer residing near Island City. It is alleged that Deal took the horse from the range near La Grande, shipped it with others to Portland and drove it from there to Salem, where he sold it.

District Attorney F. S. Ivanhoe, of the Union-Wallowa county district, is prosecuting the case, while J. D. Slater of La Grande, a brother of Attorney R. J. Slater of this city, is defending Mr. Deal. The case was called by Judge Bean at 9 o'clock this morning and the forenoon was spent in securing a jury.

Among those who are here from Union county as witnesses are the following well known citizens: D. A. and J. W. McAllister, George Childers, Sheriff Frank Childers, D. D. Grandy, Dexter Eaton, Charles Teal, Fred D. Gaskell, E. L. Halley and several others.

This is the second offense of this kind for Mr. Deal in the past few years. In 1902 he was sentenced to the penitentiary from Union county for the theft of a horse, but owing to his advanced age and good behavior while in prison, he was pardoned

within a few months after going to Salem.

The Jury.

The following is the jury selected for the trial of Deal:

This forenoon the selection of the jury occupied nearly all the time, but the opening addresses were given before the noon recess. At the opening of court this afternoon E. L. Halley, owner of the horse alleged to have been stolen, was called to the stand as the first witness for the state.

Barnum & Bailey Coming.

The composed behavior of "Wotan," a trained horse that makes a balloon ascension, and the startling feat of the rival automobiles, hurtling through the air, in the course of their frightfully perilous race, are productive alike of wonder and terror, and the memory of them is one of overwhelming admiration of skill, ingenuity and inveterate courage. The female performers who ride in those automobiles—"the Sister La Rague"—must possess nerves of steel. The horse Wotan is, of course, under control of his mistress, Lena Marnder, but only a performer of intrepid spirit and adamant constancy could endure the ordeal of that balloon ascent and descent, the latter made amid the bewilderment of fireworks! The great audience—in itself a most imposing spectacle—was moved to a tremendous outburst of spontaneous enthusiasm.
