Dry States Irrigation Systems.

A Washington dispatch says: The constitutional lawyers of the senate are preparing to have their filing. Arguments about the "plans of the father," and states' rights will be worked over time when that body comes to take the measure from the judiciary committee intending to restrict the traffic of intoxicating liquors between "wet" and "dry" states.

When the various bills on this subject were being considered by the committee there were almost as many different views expressed as there were members. The bill that finally got out of committee was a compromise. Instead of giving a "dry" state the right to hold up shipments of liquor at the state border, as desired by the prohibition forces, it merely prevents a railroad from acting as agent for the consignor, and requires the full name and address of both consignor and consignee to be inscribed on the package.

Some irritation is likely to be manifested when the debate comes on. The pin points of the constitution that are thought likely by legal experts to stick into the practical enforcement of state prohibition may cause sores. It is the argument of the senators from the "dry" and "near dry" states that the freedom of interstate traffic in liquor makes prohibitory state laws of little effect. It takes only a few months under the present laws to establish a complete system of irrigation for "dry" states from the outside where the damp is unconfined.

Hen Worth \$1000 a Pound.

Booneville, Mo., April 23.—Booneville has a hen for which its owner has refused a fortune, which has been three times around the world, costs \$1800 a year to maintain and has a private calet of her own. Peg's food is cooked especially and the traveling expenses of this hen are enormous. She has won honors for her owner, and is worth almost \$1000 a pound. Peg is given a bath every day, her beak and comb manicured, her legs scrubbed and she is given exercise in an open lot with clean straw and fresh worms. No other chickens are allowed to associate with her. She is fed toasted bread and the finest of ground meats.

Had a Hardware Store.

Seattle, Wash., April 23.—Eleven knife blades, six screws, five nails, three tacks and several other miscellaneous pieces of shelf and heavy hardware were removed from the interior of Henry Harrison, a vaudeville performer, who makes a specialty of eating glass and hardware. He has been in the business for 20 years and estimates that he has eaten a ton of hardware, and is at a loss to understand why the pieces removed by the surgeon should have been indigestible.
