AGREE ON NEW LAW

A Chicago dispatch says that the general managers of the principal railroads west of Chicago and the representatives of men engaged in train service announced today their agreement as to the application of the 16-hour law. Crews are not to be tied up unless it is apparent that the trip cannot be completed within the lawful time, and not then until after the expiration of 14 hours on duty under federal law or within two hours of the time limit provided by state laws, if state laws govern. Crews tied up by a less number of hours than mentioned above are to be regarded as tied up under the law, and will be paid.

When crews are tied up between terminals under the law they are to be considered on duty and under pay immediately upon the expiration of the minimum legal period off duty applicable to the crew, provided the period of rest for any member, eight or 10 hours, be the period of rest for the entire crew. Crews tied up will be paid the time or mileage of their schedules from initial point to tie-up point, and when "timed or dead-headed into terminal" will be paid the same as if the run is made. Pay is allowed for any service for an engine crew if held responsible for the engine.

LA GRANDE SETS EXAMPLE.

Richardson Writes of Good Work Done in Beet City.

If Pendleton does as well towards establishing a publicity bureau at the meeting next Monday night as La Grande did last evening, the movement will be a success.

Writing from Union this morning Tom Richardson told President Alexander of the Commercial association that the sum of \$3300 was pledged by La Grande men last evening and that the fund of \$6000 was assured.

In the movement at La Grande the banks led by donating \$50 per month towards the movement. The town of Elgin also came into the game by offering \$600 towards the fund and it is understood that that amount will be doubled.—Pendleton E. O.

The Sugar Farms.

Work on the big sugar beet farms tributary to Union, is in full blast at present. The seedling for the most part will be completed this week, says the Union Republican.

The recent arrival of about 80 German people—69 of whom are laborers from the Walla Walla section, marks a distinct period in sugar beet culture in this section. It is the purpose of the company to eventually supply Jap, Greek and Korean labor with Germans, and this will be done if this season's experiment proves satisfactory.

The question of housing the new laborers and their families is an item that is quite a serious one, but the company hopes to arrange for this in time.

The business men of Union are hustling for the trade of the newly arrived Germans and it is coming to Union all right.

The company, during the past winter, shipped from the Hall ranch, among other things, 200 tons of hay and five cars of barley, all of which was loaded on the cars right at the ranch.

Labor is reported plentiful on the sugar farms this year—a condition most gratifying to the sugar company.

Everything now points to a most successful season on the big farms, the plans contemplating smaller acreage to the man and better cultivation.

Messrs. Sebbelov and Posselt are to be congratulated upon the systematic work that is being done and the bright prospects for the season.
