ing on the ground with a sprained ankle on a Montana ranch, having fallen from a scaffold. On inquiry where I was the owner of the farm told me I had been working for him for three weeks. He said I had applied to him for a position at Helena; I asked him to take me to Helena; but he would not, because, he said I was not well enough to make the trip.

"The next day I wrote a letter to my wife at Crescent, but she was in Spokane at the time and did not receive it. The letter is still at the Crescent postoffice. The next day went to Helena and looked up Mr. Crowell, my wife's brother-in-law. He saw that I received medical treatment and after being with him two days left for Spokane, having sufficient recovered to make the trip. The robber who assaulted me took \$200 in gold from my purse and a revolver from my trousers pocket, but over-looked \$200 in bills which I had sewed to the inside of my vest. I came in the day before to deposit the money in a bank, but the banks were all closed when I arrived here, it being Saturday afternoon."

Friends of Mr. Harmon say they know of no reason why he should have knowingly left home. His business affairs are said to be in good shape and it is declared that he has never had any trouble with his family.

Following eight hours, is in response to wired instructions from the chief dispatcher to come to a more satisfactory terminal, but at the responsibility of the company and not on his own. To illustrate, if a train reached its 16-hour limit while at Hot Lake, the only way that the crew can move on is to come to La Grande on the responsibility of the company, which must stand for infractions of the law.

There are many other minor matters of considerable importance. The question of commencing pay after the lay-offs, required much legislation. Some roads suffered slightly by the agreements, but on the whole all four brotherhoods have been benefited by the conference which, taken as a whole, was a decided victory for the employees.

Mr. Cross will remain in La Grande today and goes to Pendleton at once. Later in the week he will visit General Manager O'Brien and General Superintendent Buckley at Portland, laying before them the stipulations of the Chicago agreements.
