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BOOSTERS IN PENDLETON ARE FOUND SADLY WANTING

A strange reluctance towards subscribing money with which to carry on a publicity campaign marked the meeting held at the court house last evening and from a standpoint of immediate results the meeting was declared a failure by Tom Richardson, says the Pendleton East Oregonian.

Though the representative business men and property owners of the city were present, but a half dozen or so were willing to help finance a publicity bureau. Of these one was a banker, while the others were merchants. From those who own buildings and other property about the city from which they receive high rents, not a cent could be secured for the development of the city and county.

At the opening of the meeting Tom Richardson was introduced by President Alexander of the Commercial association, who expressed gratification that the audience was composed of representatives from all portions of the county.

The Value of Publicity.
 In a very interesting half hour talk Mr. Richardson explained the nature of the work being done by the Portland Commercial club. He also told of the development work at New Orleans, where he was located before coming to Oregon, and of the movements that are now on at Eugene, Medford, Astoria, La Grande and other places throughout the state.

He argued that Pendleton and the other important towns of the state should maintain a publicity bureau. To do this he declared would require money and popular subscription offered the only means of securing the same.

Turning to the immediate work of raising funds he asked for offers of \$25 per month towards a publicity bureau.

Matlock Responds Not.
 "Mr. Matlock," said he, addressing W. F. Matlock, who was in the audience, "won't you start this list with a \$25 per month subscription?"

But Mr. Matlock replied not, and for a time it looked as though there was no one to start the ball rolling. Finally M. B. Gwinn volunteered \$25 per month in behalf of the Pendleton Savings bank and the crowd cheered.

After trying in vain to secure more \$25 offers the limit was reduced to \$15 and finally to \$10 per month. At the latter rate R. Alexander, the Peoples Warehouse, Koeppen Bros., R. H. Wilcox and E. J. Murphy all subscribed. But no other offers were forthcoming and the effort was given up in disgust.

Richardson Was Disappointed.
 "Fellow citizens, this is the first time such a thing as this has happened in Oregon since I have been here," said Tom Richardson, when he saw that his appeal had been in vain. "This movement so far has been a failure. It is not for me to say what you people shall give and I can only leave it to you."

Later on in the evening James Johns roused the ire of the visitor by saying that Portland seemed to look upon eastern Oregon solely as a land of sagebrush and jackrabbits. Coming back into the fray Mr. Richardson clasped the remark as an insult and then took occasion to pour a few hot shots into the local business camp.

SAD DEATH OCCURS AT LOSTINE SUNDAY EVENING

The body of Miss Frances Wymer, who died at Lostine Sunday, arrived on the Elgin train yesterday evening, and was shipped to her former home in Page county, Iowa, on the evening train, accompanied by two brothers. Miss Wymer came to La Grande some time last winter, hoping the change of climate would prove beneficial. After the family had settled at Joseph they attempted to move the invalid from La Grande, making the trip overland. The end came when the party reached Lostine, and they were obliged to return with the body.

The deceased was a sister of J. S. Spiker of this city.

DE SAGAN WANTS DISPENSATION

French Count Appeals to Pope Relative to His Coming Marriage.
 Naples, April 29.—Prince Helle de Sagan has addressed a communication to the Vatican, asking that a dispensation be granted by the church for his marriage with Anna Gould, a divorced person. As the church only grants this dispensation in certain cases and as none of these are offered as reasons for granting the writ, it is not thought the church will approve of the marriage. A civil ceremony will probably be performed in France soon.
