### Alaskan Delegates.

Washington, May 1.—Two delegates to represent the republicans of Alaska in the Chicago convention will be elected at a territorial convention to be held at Ketchikan tomorrow. Ad- vices from the land of snow and gold state that the delegation will probably be pledged to Secretary Taft.

Six delegates had already been elected when the republican national committee met in Washington last December, but by the terms of the call they were declared to have been prematurely chosen, and Alaska was told that no delegate from that territory would be seated at the convention until others were named. The call further stipulated that only two would be seated instead of six.

As the six delegates had been in- structed to vote for Secretary Taft their rejection was received with jubila- tion by the opponents of the secre- tary, who saw a loss of four votes to him and the possibility that Alaska could not elect her allotted two dele- gates in time to be represented at the convention. They realized that an election in Alaska is a much different and more difficult matter than a short walk to the polls in the United States, and some hope was expressed that, having once gone on record, the Alas- kians would be content to forego an- other election. But in this hope they did not reckon on the determination of the Alaskans to exercise their rights of ballot and the calibre of Thomas Cale, the territorial delegate in congress, who holds strong views as to the interest his people should take in national politics. Mr. Cale believes that the Alaskans prize the right of ballot more highly than any other Americans, and that the two new dele- gates will be instructed for Secretary Taft unless a light vote somewhat changes the situation. Mr. Cale is a Vermonter by birth, but has lived in Alaska 10 years and is serving his first term in congress. He was elected on a non-partisan ticket, although he is more closely allied with the republic- ans than the democrats, and is listed in the former column.

### Brook Trout Season.

Albany, N. Y., May 1.—Under the modification of the fish and game laws made by the last legislature the brook trout season opens today in the Adirondack counties. Instead of or April 16. The lake trout season also opens today, except in Lakes Erie, On- tario and Keuka on Long Island.

### Sixteen-Hour Law.

Washington, May 1.—The new 16- hour work-day law, affecting railway conductors, engineers, firemen and trainmen, went into effect today. It is believed that the law will operate without friction between the railroads and their employes, if mutual conces- sions are made.

### Rumors of Change.

It is rumored about the railroad yards that a radical change in the running time of the through passen- gers is about to be made. According to the rumors, the change will affect all four trains.
