A STRONG
SERMON

Another large audience greeted Evangelist Haudenschield when he called for order at the rink last night promptly at 8 o'clock. He conducted the song service and infused quite a lot of life in the choir. He has the same fault that afflicts so many leaders of singing and that is an abominable drawl.

A noticeable thing about the audience was that all who could, gathered in the middle row of seats. The reason was that there were filled with old church pews and chairs. The new seats at a few places are a little pitchy but these can easily be avoided. The seats are nearly all tamarack and are as free from pitch as anyone could expect. An hour's work would remove all pitch.

The opening prayer was made by Rev. J. D. Gillilan. The lesson read was the 24th chapter of Deuteronomy. In connection with the reading the evangelist stated that there are 33,000 promises in the Bible and every one is conditional.

The text is in Hebrews, 4th chapter, 5th verse. "Being made perfect he became the author of eternal salvation to all them that obey him." The theme was obedience. There is no salvation without it. It is the key word of the Bible from Genesis to Revelation. Without obedience there can be no house, no school, no government, no salvation. Nothing will make up for obedience. God allows nothing used to be substituted for it.

The first king that God chose, Saul, lost his kingdom through disobedience. Adam's lack of obedience cost the world its pristine purity. Every man who ever disobeyed God suffered for it sooner or later. There are times when men should stop praying and do what God tells them. Don't call disobedience a small thing. God calls it a great thing. "Obedience is better than sacrifice." The stories of the disobedience of Achan and Samson were most graphically told. In fact the most remarkable thing in the talk of the evening was the speaker's power of description. He is probably the most intensely dramatic religious speaker on the American platform.

A BUSINESS FAKE.

Baker City Man Wants to Force Goods on La Grande Merchants.

A Baker City business man uses some very unbusiness-like methods. He was indiscreet enough to overload his stock with certain articles and in order to get rid of these, he endeavored to "stuff" them off on the unsophisticated merchants of La Grande.

May Stop at New Orleans.

The concession is due to the total elimination of ticket scalpers from the city.
