FULL TRACK MEET SCORE

Walla Walla, May 2.—(Special.)—The big second annual tri-state track meet is now a matter of history and the scores of defeated contestants are discussing how it happened. Notwithstanding the excellent showing made by La Grande in the preliminaries, their company was too fast in the finals. As usual, Jay's individuality landed Pendleton well up in the front. Island City won one point, while La Grande and Baker City fared alike—unable to register. With 21 points to his credit, Jay stands as the peer of all around athletes in the northwest. His age is also above the average high school student, but nevertheless the true sport must look twice with jealous eye on the ability of one man to roll up a score such as he did yesterday. The final figures show the following schools as winners in the order given. Lewiston, 40, Spokane 32, Pendleton 30, Watsburg 11, Prosser 8, Walla Walla 5, Ellensburg 3, North Yakima 1, Island City 1.

Do Away With Bridges.

County Commissioner Ben Brown was down from Island City Monday on business connected with the changing of the county road on Clark's creek, near the Elliott residence. The county court proposes to make a slight change in the location of the road that will do away with three crossings and cut out the expense of maintaining three bridges. The owners of the Elliott farm are opposed to the change, holding that it will result detrimental to their property in that it shuts out a portion of the land from the creek, and they are offering all the opposition possible. Mr. Brown informed a Recorder reporter that the court would make the change, regardless of results, and that he had ordered the supervisor of the district to open the new road and proceed with the work of placing it in condition for travel. The result is yet to be determined.
