The plan is a splendid one. A full list of every article that is up for sale will be published, and the prospective buyer can come to the city forewarned of what is on sale. In this way he can select what he cares to bid on, before the article or animal is put on the block.

While every attention possible is given the Automobile day next Saturday, still there is much attention given the next Market day, even at this early date. Mr. Larsen will soon have completed his work of listing saleable property as soon as possible, and the committee will arrange its sale accordingly.
