## DELIVERS FINE SERMON

Last Night's Services at the Rink Largely Attended—"Sin; Its Effect and Cure" is the Subject for the Revivalist's Discourse—Review of the Address as Given Last Evening—Business Men's Meeting Tonight.

For a long time in La Grande God's

people have occupied the conservative attitude and delight in "hand-picked" fruit which is always good. His satanic majesty's kingdom has not been largely disturbed, however, by this process. But conditions have changed. Under the valiant leadership of a commanding and inspiring man of God Satan's kingdom has been invaded, his right to rule has been challenged and many are passing over from the kingdom of darkness into the kingdom of light and Satan howls. He has been hit hard and the flow of opposition to his infamous rule is fast becoming a consuming fire.

Last night the rink was well filled early and the meeting was a most excellent one. Mr. Haudenschield spoke with a prophetic uncton on "Sin; Its Effect and Cure." The Scriptures used were two, "All Have Sinned" and "If we confess our sins He is faithful and just to forgive us our sins and cleanse us from all unrighteousness." He said in part:

"All are in sin, shut up in hopeless guilt, but all may be saved by penitent confession and forsaking of sin. Sin is the great enemy of the individual, the home, of the state, of the nation." These utterances were illustrated and enforced. Sin may be dealt with in three ways: First, the world deals with sin in a heartless manner. A Judas hangs himself. The accusers would stone the unfortunate woman taken in her sin. But these stand by this attitude, where they can never be forgiven. Then the law deals with sin, and says: "The soul that sinneth it shall die." The law is a shrewd detector, pursuing in hot haste to bring a just condemnation on the sinner.

But God forgives sin when it is confessed and forsaken. And forgiven, it is bolted out, covered over and forgotten and the sinner is dealt with as though he had never sinned. These great facts of gospel truth were so forcibly discussed and illustrated that strong men and women wept and many came boldly to declare themselves on the side of Christ and righteousness. So the good work goes on with ever-increasing power.

At 2 this afternoon a most delightful meeting and strengthening service was held in the First Baptist church. Here "Hindrances to Prayer" is being discussed in a series of able discourses. Tonight the meeting will be of deep and pungent interest to business people of the city. Mr. Haudenschield will discuss the question, "Will it pay?" Men of the city, Satan is a hard master. His wages are death and doom. But "acres of diamonds" lie at your feet; rich treasures had for the gathering. Don't fail to hear this message.

## NEW BANK AT COVE

Resultant of the new banking law which went into effect in Oregon on May 1, the Eastern Oregon Trust & Savings bank of this city will withdraw its branch institution at Cove, and in its place will be organized an institution which was incorporated yesterday. The new law prohibits branch banks throughout the state, and as the bank which has been thriving at Cove for the past year or more, a branch of the home bank here, it consequently fell under the ban of the new law.

The Cove State bank is the title of the new banking institution. With a capital stock of \$10,000 the firm was incorporated by S. G. Rees, J. E. Trippier and G. E. Stock. The last named gentleman was cashier of the old institution. Just who will have charge of the bank has not yet been decided, as the stockholders have not held

their initial business meeting. At a meeting to be held at a near date, the officials will be selected.

The new bank will no doubt pick up the business of the branch institution where it was left off when the new law forced the branch office out of business.

## SEEKING A DIVORCE

Mrs. Bertha Leander has brought proceedings in the circuit court to secure a divorce from Frank Leander, her husband. In her complaint, which was filed with the clerk of the circuit court yesterday, she alleges desertion. The case will be heard before Judge Crawford no' long hence.

The plaintiff in the case is the mother of Miss Irene Kinzie, who was recently taken to the Home of the Good Shepherd in Portland, for disorderly conduct committed in this city.

However, Mr. Deal has not given up hope of keeping out of the "pen," for through his attorney, J. D. Slater of this city, notice has been given to the supreme court of an appeal to be made. A writ of probable cause will be asked for so as to keep the old gentleman out of prison during the appeal. Bonds for this purpose to the extent of \$1,000 was posted today.

Mr. Deal is an old resident of this city and county. The crime of which he was found guilty by a Umatilla county jury is horse stealing, the theft being made by Deal last August, when he, according to the findings of the jury, took a horse from Halley and disposed of it at Salem, where the animal was found later.

**Whitman College Notes.**  
Whitman College, Walla Walla, May 6.—(Special.)—Whitman college won the big intercollegiate track meet at Pullman last Saturday between the University of Idaho, Washington State college and Whitman college. Whitman's score was 52, W. S. C. 37, and Idaho 32. Whitman won nine out of the 14 1/2 places, Idaho won five and Pullman did not win a single first place, and lost the relay to Idaho as well. Philbrook of Whitman won four first places and Martin of Whitman tied the coast record in the 100 yard dash at 22 seconds flat and did the 100 in 10 flat.

Whitman regards this as the most important victory of the year. Having defeated the University of Washington at Seattle in a track meet a few days ago, Whitman already has the championship of three states, and hopes to land the northwest championship when the University of Oregon comes to Walla Walla on the 13th of May. With good weather May 13 is expected to do the 100 in less than 10 seconds.
