THE MEET CALLED OFF

The Union county track meet has been definitely called off for various reasons. The chief obstacle to this heretofore annual athletic event in this county is the fact that no race tracks are located sufficiently near to either Union or La Grande to guarantee expense money. The gate entrance fee and livery hire as a rule throws the spectators' expense to such a figure that few care to expend the money.

To Baker Friday.

Next Friday the La Grande track team leaves for Baker City, where the annual eastern Oregon track and field meet will be held. Many of the rooters and followers are planning to leave on Saturday morning.

La Grande's chances to land a close second place or perhaps a first place in this meet are excellent. In the try-outs at Walla Walla, La Grande entries showed up favorably with other teams of eastern Oregon, excepting Pendleton. There is litigation now in progress as to the eligibility of Jay, the star Pendletonian. The declamation contest will be held on Friday night.

New York's "Finest" Parade.

New York, May 9.—One of the most imposing parades of police ever seen in any city marched through the streets of New York today. Five thousand uniformed club-wielders, infantry and cavalry, participated in the drill which was reviewed by Governor Hughes, Mayor McClellan, Police Commissioner Bingham and the heads of city departments. A feature of the program was the awarding of medals for conspicuous bravery. The right to wear these medals is the most coveted honor of the police department. Every member of the honor squad has, on one or more occasions, risked his life in the performance of duty. Twenty-eight police heroes, who have been awarded the Rhineland, Bell or Meyer medals in the last decade for deeds of exceptional daring, marched at the head of today's police parade.

SIX WILL GRADUATE

\$500 has been loaned to young girls of this state to assist them in procuring an education that will fit them to become better wage earners or better mothers. There are also concrete and immediate benefits to come from federation. Through membership in the state organization every club has access to the bureau of information, established by the general federation and conducted by Mrs. Mary I. Wood at Portsmouth, N. H. Here every kind of literature or information, along any line of club activities, may be procured, outlines for special study or entire courses of study, books of reference, papers upon any subject, year books and in short every demand of the club is satisfied without money and without price.

Summing it all up, federation calls for closer relationship and united effort, hearty co-operation in enlarged opportunities, and unity of action with diversified methods.
