### UNION REVIVAL MEETINGS CLOSE

LARGEST CROWD OF SERIES LAST NIGHT.

Great Day Yesterday at the Rink—Big Building Filled With Interested Listeners—Three Thrilling Services—Many Conversions Have Resulted From Long Campaign in This City—Evangelist Goes to Tacoma Tomorrow.

The co-operating churches partici-

parting in the Haudenschild meetings enjoyed a great day yesterday. The weather was favorable and in the morning service a multitude filled the rink, and listened with rapt attention to the sermon on "The Heart Cry—'Oh, That I Might Know Him.'" The discourse dealt with Paul's aspiration to know Christ, and produced a profound impression. Many were moved to tears and it was manifest that the heart cry of the great audience was for a more definite knowledge of Jesus Christ.

#### Address to Men.

At 3 in the afternoon about 300 men assembled and listened attentively to one of the strongest appeals ever heard in this city. The evangelist's theme was "The Red Light" and pre-

sented the warning, "Prepare to meet thy God."

#### Young People's Meeting.

At the hour of 7, Pastor Gibson led a union meeting of young people in praise service in which many participated, giving forth glad expressions of gratitude.

#### Greatest Crowd Yet.

Again at 8 in the rink, with the greatest audience of the series, a splendid service was conducted. The singing by the large chorus choir leading the audience, was most inspiring, and prepared the way for the evangelist's fervent and touching discourse on "The Lost Opportunity," from the text, "The Harvest is past, the summer is ended, and we are not saved."

In response to the appeal to accept Christ a number of people came forward.

During the day the matter of compensation of the evangelist was presented and free will offerings called for. About \$290 was given.

Before closing the evening service Mr. Haudenschild expressed his appreciation of the faithful service and co-operation of pastors, singers and others who have contributed to the success of the meetings.

Mr. Haudenschild has been fearless in his denunciation of sin and very earnest in his appeals to accept the Savior.

As a union evangelist he has been decidedly fair with all the co-operating churches.

This evening at 8 an informal reception will be tendered Mr. and Mrs. Haudenschild in the Presbyterian church. All friends are invited. Tomorrow morning the evangelist and his wife start for Tacoma, where a meeting will be held in the Epworth M. E. church.

## SEATTLE IN EXCITEMENT

Seattle, Wash., May 18.—Seattle will attempt to prove its claim as the most hospitable city on the Pacific coast when the battleship fleet, which leaves San Francisco today, arrives here on Saturday. This will be the last official reception to the officers and sailors before they depart on their long voyage around the world, and the citizens of this booming metropolis are determined to make it the most memorable of all the voyages.

When the flagship of Admiral Thomas leads the great fleet into Elliott bay next Saturday afternoon, he will find awaiting him the executive officials of all the states and cities of the northwest. Tens of thousands of citizens will cheer the gallant tars, guns will boom a noisy welcome and the whistles of scores of steam craft of all kinds will toot in tumultuous joy. That will be but the beginning. Admiral Thomas will be presented with a key to the city, made of solid gold from Alaska nuggets, and every other officer and sailor will be presented with an assortment of the 57 varieties of hospitality that Seattle will have constantly on tap during the stay of the fleet.

The great land parade that will be one of the features of the celebration will take place on the morning of Monday next. That day will furnish the greatest military spectacle ever offered the people of the northwest. There will be 19,000 men in line, including galleons and marines from the battleships, 14 companies of coast artillery, companies of infantry from Fort Lawton, national guardsmen and many uniformed fraternal organizations.

Elaborate preparations are being made for decorating the city and the line of march of the parade will be literally covered with flags, bunting and other hangings that will make a splendid background for the brilliant pageant to pass before the thousands of persons who will crowd every point of vantage.

One of the greatest events of the program of entertainment for the public will be aquatic sports on the bay. These will include boat races by crews from the battleships, launch races by the swiftest tenders from the warships and other events of like character. In order that the public may have an opportunity to view these races in comfort, not only will many barges be provided by private parties for carrying visitors to the scene, but permission will be obtained from the admiral of the fleet for persons to view the races from the decks of the warships.

The battleships will be moored in a large horseshoe formation around the city, and as the races and other aquatic events will take place within this horseshoe the spacious decks of the war vessels will provide room for thousands who desire to enjoy the spectacle.

### REMARKABLE SCENE. Wonderful Enthusiasm Over Anti-Liquor Movement at Conference.

Here is the description of a scene which George H. Currey, of The Observer, saw in Baltimore a few days since, when the quadrennial address of the bishops was read to the general conference. This conference represents a few more than three millions of members and every one of them is a prohibitionist, although they are allied to any and to all parties. The liquor question is not a political one. The following is a description of the scene:

"When Bishop Goodsell had read the scathing denunciation of the liquor traffic, he called upon the delegates—57 being the number—to 'rise here now, and with the bishops pledge eternal fidelity to this foe of man and of God.' The entire assemblage sprang to its feet, uttering cheer after cheer. One of the delegates started 'America.' The great throng caught up the hymn, and the hall resounded with strains. Then some one started the hymn, 'Glory, Glory, Hallelujah! Our God is marching on.' This new outlet for enthusiasm was seized upon, and to the tune of 'John Brown's

Body' the verse was repeated several times."
