Market Day Affairs.
A long list of salable property is now in the hands of the auctioneer, and while the races are on at the fair grounds, those interested in the many valuable things that will be on sale will congregate at some point in the business district. The Market day sales are very popular and people from outlying points in the valley will be here with stock and many other articles.

Festivities begin at an early hour. The monster parade will start at 11 o'clock sharp, and will be over in time for luncheon. After a brief respite the La Grande band will reopen excitement with a concert. For an hour the farmers will be given an opportunity to do their shopping and listen to the music as well. A 2 again things will begin to segregate, a portion attending the market day sales and others going to the fair grounds to attend the races, which start at 3 o'clock sharp.

ere and Washington is too great to allow of complete verification. At any rate, La Grande is to have a new postoffice building, and very probably a federal building in which will be housed the land office and other public offices.

When Pendleton secured a liberal appropriation recently, La Grande business men were disheartened, but an announcement today will give new life.

The bill referred to is one which has been before the house and senate for some time. It provides for federal buildings at Pendleton, Walla Walla and several other cities. The interpretation now placed on Mr. Fulton's message is that the amendment to this bill provides for a \$65,000 federal building for La Grande, and in addition to that a federal postoffice building.

The other version of the telegram is that the sum stipulated is for a federal building in La Grande, in which will be housed the postoffice.

Cuba's "Fourth of July."

Havana, May 20.—Cuba's "Fourth of July," the anniversary of the inauguration of the republic, was celebrated today with much enthusiasm throughout the island. Sports of all kinds dear to the heart of the Cuban, were indulged in, the orators sang the praises of "Cuba libre" and were loud in their predictions of a glorious future, bands played, explosives and firecrackers made a hideous din, and in other ways the celebration resembled the annual patriotic outburst of the big republic which is now acting as a temporary guardian of Cuba.

The new organized Junta Patriotica, with a board composed of 100 members, under the presidency of the aged Marquis of Santa Lucia, played a prominent part in the patriotic exercises. The object of the league is to interfere in political struggles and prevent ill feeling, revolutions and acts of violence from future governments, which, leading to armed protests, might endanger order and cause intervention again.

Marquis de Santa Lucia was president of the so-called Cuban republic in the bushes during the war of 1868-1878. La Lucia says it is a pity that he is too old to become the only presidential candidate for all Cubans in the forthcoming election.

Small Fire.

This afternoon the fire bell announced that there was a fire in some part of the city. The department responded promptly only to find a small blaze in a barn belonging to F. C. Bramwell. The fire did not amount to much, and by the time the alarm was turned in had been put out by neighbors. The barn sustained no damage.

Killed by a Work Train.

Mr. Winters, the bridge watchman, who was injured at Weatherby and brought to the city Saturday and

placed in the hospital, died last evening from the injuries he received, says the Baker City Herald. From reports his own foolishness caused his death, for he attempted to run in front of the work train from Weatherby to Huntington, and as the train was rounding a curve the engine struck him and he was fatally injured. The body will be held at Welch's undertaking parlors until they receive orders from the O. R. & N. company, under whom he was employed.
