BUILDING IN DOUBT YET

PENDLETON PAPER GIVES RESUME OF CONDITIONS.

The fate of the omnibus bill is still a doubt and Pendleton may not receive its building this year. The fate of the omnibus federal

building bill in which an appropriation of \$70,000 for a federal building in this city is included, is still uncertain and it looks now as though it might not become a law at this session, although its friends are doing everything in their power to secure its passage through the senate.

The East Oregonian received the following dispatch from the Washington correspondent of the United Press this afternoon regarding the fate of the bill:

"The omnibus federal building bill has been sent to the secretary of the treasury for his opinion on its merits. Every effort is being made to pass the bill if within human power, at this session, but both it and the currency bill appear to be in danger of not passing at this session."

However, the Associated Press sent out a different story regarding at least a portion of the omnibus bill, a special to the Walla Walla Union of this morning reading as follows:

The senate today passed the omnibus public building bill, inserting not only the numerous amendments suggested by the senate committee or public buildings and grounds, but also a few proposed by individual senators. As passed, the bill carries a total of about \$35,000,000, of which \$5,000,000 is for buildings contracts.

The larger appropriations for new buildings added by the senate included: Riverside, Cal., \$125,000; Everett and Walla Walla, Wash., \$140,000.

The limit of cost fixed for the sub-treasury building in San Francisco was increased from \$375,000 to \$625,000.

The senate amendment providing for a new office building for the department of state and justice to be used jointly was retained, the ultimate cost of which is limited to \$2,500,000 and it is hinted that if this item is not retained the bill may be allowed to fail.

The amendment appropriating

\$400,000 for purchase of an embassy building in Paris to be used as an office and residence, was also accepted by the senate.—Pendleton East Oregonian.

SEVEN AFTER CARRIERSHIP

Seven applicants will report to Miss Riesland, assistant secretary of the civil service commission, to take the examinations to fill vacancies in the city carrier list tomorrow morning. At least seven have taken out application blanks, and it is believed that a large majority of them will apply. The recent examination did not give the department sufficient carriers and the second examination was called for.

The examination will be conducted by Miss Riesland, the applicants having instructions to report at 9 o'clock in the morning. From this list of applicants it is believed that a sufficient number will pass to fill the carrier list and to allow prompt institution of the free mail delivery system on August 1.

Ordinance No. 383, Series 1908.

An ordinance authorizing the mayor and recorder to purchase water pipe and hydrants.

The City of La Grande does ordain as follows:

Section 1. That the mayor and recorder be, and they are hereby authorized to purchase from the Pacific Coast Pipe company of Seattle, 1500 feet of four-inch wooden pipe, at 2 1/2 cents per foot; 2 Corey hydrants, at \$36.50 each; and 3-4 inch T's, prices f. o. b. Seattle.

Sec. 2. Inasmuch as there is immediate need for said articles, an emergency is hereby declared to exist, and this ordinance shall take effect, after its approval by the mayor, and its publication in one issue of the La Grande Evening Observer on the 23d day of May, 1908.

Passed the common council on the 20th day of May, 1908, by seven members voting therefor.
