Ridding at the First Public Market Day Sale to Be Held in La Grande Proved to Be Brisk-Many Assemble at Kirtley's Livery Stable to Bid on Large Variety of Goods on Sale --Event Very Satisfactory to Promot-

Alternately wiping the perspiration from his brow and crying out the na ture and value of his wares, Auctioneer Martin Larsen this afternoon dis posed of many fine articles for these who wish to sell at public auction. Clustered around him, enjoying the sunshine, were many farmers who clinked gold coins involuntarily as they shot the bids up, one over the other.

The first market day sale has been a satisfactory one. The auctioncer commenced with a plow and before he was through horses, surreys, vehicles of every description, in fact, and even spinning wheels, have been placed on the block and knocked down to the highest bidder.

Women intermingled with the crowd freely. They apparently enjoyed the scene of witnessing men trying to down the other in manner and volume of bidding to secure a certain piece of goods, horse or implement suitable for farm use.

The sales were held in front of the Kirtley livery stables.
