Escaped Jail by Want Ad.
Utica, N. Y., May 23.—The efficacy of want "ads" has again been demonstrated by John L. Silber, a young man of this city, who has recently been making a tour of the west. According to reports received by friends of Silber, he was arrested in Newkirk, Okla., and sent to jail. Friendless and almost penniless, the young man conceived the idea of appealing to the public through a want "ad." He spent his last quarter for the insertion in an Oklahoma City paper of the following advertisement:

Wanted—Young man in jail wants out. Suggestions solicited that might

lead to his immediate release. The response was immediate. Several prominent attorneys interested themselves in Silber's case and Governor Haskell of Oklahoma, was induced to issue a pardon.

"DRY" MEETING BIG SUCCESS

The local option meeting in the rink last night was all that the most ardent friends of prohibition for Union county asked or expected. Such a demonstration has never before been seen in La Grande and we doubt whether eastern Oregon has equaled it.

The La Grande band was out for the occasion and rendered a number of selections on the street, and one at the rink. The people came in crowds and they were people who are in earnest. Business men, wives, heavy taxpayers, members of the bar, ministers, teachers and the ladies who are so deeply concerned in the outcome June 1. It was a representative audience. The audience sang "America" and the speaking began. Later C. E. Cochran sang "Oregon, My Oregon," using the new version, which tells of a saloon-less state. It was a hit, as was also the "New Star Spangled Banner" rendered by W. K. Davis. We cannot refer to each speech separately. The very names of the speakers indicate a very strong presentation of the subject. The question was viewed from the political, business, physiological and moral standpoints. No insults were hurled at the saloonkeeper.

Calmly, yet earnestly, the speakers presented the claims of business, society, the home, and God, for the abolition of the liquor traffic. The applause that punctuated their remarks showed a sympathetic audience. The following well known men participated:

WANT OVER 220 PICKERS

That there will be a demand for 220 cherry pickers more than now available at Cove, is the remarkable fact given by C. M. Stackland of Cove, who is here today. The cherry crop is so far advanced that the picking will be started about July 12, unless extremely hard frosts ruin the prospects within a few days. This is hardly possible and growers from that section of the valley say the crop will be remarkably large. The pickers will be in such great demand that something new in the way of advertising for help must be resorted to. Mr. Stackland alone will need 40 pickers this year.

The strawberry crop at Cove is likewise promising, though the first picking will be late. This is due to the fact that the early blossoms were nipped by frost and the growers must depend on the latter varieties.

WEATHER FOOLS AUTO COMMITTEE

SPLENDID DAY BRINGS HUNDREDS EXPECTING PARADE.
Because Weather Has Been so Very Unsettled Up to the Past Day That the Automobile Committee Was Forced to Call Off the Parade. Disappointment Among Farmers is a Serious Matter—Blame Not Attached to Any Person.

Lining the curbing of Adams avenue today stood disappointed farmers who came to the city before the brilliant sun rays had actually ascended to an angle of 45 degrees. They came to see an automobile parade and to attend the market day sales. Because the weather conditions up to Friday were so unsettled that it was folly for the committee having things in charge for today to continue with arrangements, the farmers went away disappointed, and some of them perhaps, exasperated. Much as La Grande as a whole is pained by the disappointment handed out to the farmers, still there is no one thing but unsettled climatic conditions on which to lay the blame of the entire affair.

Early in the morning the streets began to fill with gaily dressed farmers' wives and daughters. There was a semi-circus color in the city all day. The visitors are not inexpressibly disappointed, but as stated, weather conditions are not governed by an automobile committee.

Band Fills in.
The crowds did not wait patiently until 1 o'clock without some reward. Promptly at 1 o'clock the La Grande band was out with its inspiring music and the patient crowds on the streets

began to move around more pleasantly. The committee might have presented a parade this afternoon of considerable attraction, but nothing was done.
