Referred to the People by the Legislative Assembly

For an amendment of Section 28 (evidently intended to be Section 29) of Article IV of the Constitution, changing the compensation of members of the legislature to \$400 for each regular session, and \$10 per day for each extra session, instead of \$3 per day and mileage. (Section 28 provides the time when laws take effect, and the proposed amendment is, therefore, wrongly numbered.)

An act providing that in all counties, the sheriff shall have the custody of prisoners committed to or confined in the county jail and such prisoners shall be worked at such places and for such time and in such manner as the County Court may direct, and that in counties of over one hundred thousand inhabitants, the salaries of guards and jailers shall not exceed \$90.00 per month and the price of meals furnished prisoners shall be 12 1/2 c each.
