RULE OR RUIN

LIQUOR INTERESTS OBSTRUCT IMPROVEMENTS.

Enterprises Opposed—Business Boycotted—Laboring Men Intimidated—We Have Given Them Years for Reformation—We Have Seen Enough.

The history of the liquor traffic in this county is the history of fawning patronage in times of need, and of brazen effrontery and bossism when in power. When city and county officials can be bought up it suits well, but if they cannot be bought then threats and punishment are in order. Study your town and see whether the liquor power is not a party to itself. Republicans and democrats count for nothing when the question of money and power is at issue.

How often the issue has come up this way. The city needed and the taxpayers wanted some improvement as lights, water, etc. The saloon men were angry because of some enforcement of law against gambling or Sunday selling. To punish the officials in power they voted and worked against the improvement.

Or, haven't you seen saloons refuse to support a Fourth of July celebration unless they were allowed to open gambling for a few days?

A few years ago such a bluff was offered La Grande business people, but when it was seen that we could celebrate without 'em, they walked up with a donation.

The boycott is a favorite weapon of the saloons. Many business men who know this are keeping quiet, but will vote against license and many others who know it have reached the point where they are ready to defy an institution that is so tyrannical. Every man who dares stand up and be counted for the home against the saloon is a marked man. Thank God, not a few are willing to be marked. They deserve to be marked. They deserve our best encouragement. Laboring men are attacked in the meanest way. Excellent workmen find themselves supplanted by inferior laborers who patronize and vote for saloons.

Building enterprises are talked, and it is quietly said, "We will wait till after election, and if the county goes dry we will not build." Work is promised if saloons remain open, when no such work is in the thought of the one who promises. The club is held over labor, "If you oppose as we will starve you out. Friends, Americans shall less than a hundred liquor merchants to us? Is this worthy our great state and nation? No, never!

On June 1 let every citizen, tradesman, toiler, declare for freedom from Rum and Ruin.

60 X FOR PROHIBITION.

Not Party Prohibition.
The fight to close Union county saloons under our local option law is not a fight for party prohibition. It is a movement including leading democrats and republicans, and is non-partisan.

The Farmer Vote.
The country people are generally on the right side. They have greater liberty than the merchants whose business is sometimes threatened if they stand up for reforms. Let us urge that a full vote of the farmers is asked next Monday. Hundreds of men who pay no taxes will vote, many of them against prohibition. The towns get nearly all the license, but the taxpayers of the county must pay court expenses, poor house expenses, etc. Each farmer vote, 60 X For Prohibition, will kill the vote of some fellow who pays no taxes, but wants the saloons. Rain or shine, farmer, go to the polls, and get your neighbors out.
