### ELECTION LAWS.

#### Severe Penalty Imposed for Influencing Voters.

The laws of Oregon are very severe in relation to voting at elections.

It is noted that anyone using any means whatever to coerce or influence unduly any voter is liable to a fine of \$1000 and imprisonment in the penitentiary for from one to three years.

Any corporation or organization which uses its financial influence to influence voters is liable to this fine.

Anyone having others under financial obligation to himself in any way who uses this to influence the vote of people under financial obligation to him is liable to this fine and imprisonment.

To intimidate, coerce, bribe, even with a drink of liquor, means the liability of being arrested. Section 1878 deals with this part of the law. Section 1907 gives the penalty for importing voters from any section for the purpose of voting in any intimidated before hand. Section 1908 gives the penalty for inducing voters to absent themselves, no matter what the inducement may be, the penalty is severe.

Section 1909 gives additional penalty for this same purpose. The laws of Oregon in violation to any corrupting influence whatever in this matter of elections and voting are severe and comprehensive.

Having any liquor on election day, giving it away, or any disorderly conduct is punishable with heavy fine and imprisonment.

### W. B. GRANDY HURT.

#### Ice Man Sustains Serious Injuries in Fall From Horse Yesterday.

W. B. Grandy, the ice man, sustained serious injuries yesterday while riding a horse. The animal reared and fell over backwards, carrying the rider with him. The weight of the animal fell on Mr. Grandy's chest, and had he not been physically robust, he would undoubtedly have sustained more serious injury than he did. As it was, his chest was badly squeezed, although no bones were broken. He was taken to his home and is today in considerable pain. He is unable to leave his bed, but will recover rapidly unless other complications set in.

Mr. Grandy was riding one horse and leading another, when the one being led pulled back, dragging the rider and horse over, the horse being ridden falling as above stated, upon Mr. Grandy. The accident occurred about four miles from the city, in what is known as Deal canyon.
