Washington, June 1 .- Six prominent Washington attorneys have been disbarred from practice in the department of the interior after today. It is alleged that they sought out old soldiers or their widows to whom land grants had not been issued and informed them that such land could be had on application. When the warrants were issued the lawyers advised the holders that the land could be sold at a nominal figure.
