NEWS FROM WHITMAN.

Junior Annual Published—Commencement June 10—Big Musical Event.

Whitman College, Walla Walla, June 4.—The Junior annual, "Wallatpu, Vol. III," has been received from the publishers and placed on sale. It is a handsome leather-bound volume of about 250 pages, illustrative and descriptive of the entire year at Whitman from the student standpoint. The Junior class each year has for its great task the publishing of the annual, and its appearance is one of the looked-for things of the year by the students.

With the appearance of this volume comes the election of the leaders for the publication of the next number, Ralph Matthews of Spokane, and Clarence Morrow of Walla Walla being chosen editor and manager respectively of next year's annual.

On Wednesday afternoon, June 10, the exercises of the 26th annual commencement will bring the work of Whitman college to a close for the year, and the students will scatter over the Northwest for a three month's vacation.

The events of commencement week will begin with the graduation exercises of Pearson's academy, the preparatory department of Whitman college, Friday evening, June 5. On Saturday students, faculty and alumni will board a special train for the annual college picnic at Wallatpu, the scene of the Whitman mission and Massacre. On the same evening will occur the graduation exercises of the Conservatory of Music. This is the first time that the conservatory has had separate graduation exercises, and is a mark of the growth of the music department of the institution.

The baccalaureate sermon will be preached Sunday morning by President Penrose, and in the evening, the Rev. E. A. Paddock of Weiser, Idaho, will preach the annual sermon to the Christian associations of the college. On Monday evening the New York Symphony orchestra under Walter Damrosch will play, and Mr. Damrosch will lecture in the chapel in the afternoon. Tuesday is class day, when the usual senior play will be presented. The commencement program will close with the exercises on the lawn, followed by the council dinner at Reynolds hall.

At the meeting of the board of trustees Tuesday the new constitution will be up for adoption, and the new board of overseers, made up of the most influential business and professional men of the northwest, will be appointed.

FOREST RANGER PARKER.

Business in Echo—Range Soon Open—'Phone Lines Now Complete.

Harry Parker of North Powder, chief of the forest service in the district north of the north fork of the John Day, is in La Grande today looking up records in the land office. Mr. Parker will go to Echo tonight to confer with certain stockmen of that section on the arrangements relative to the grazing on the reserve lands. Sheep will be allowed on the reserve from June 15. The range is in fine condition this year, and owing to the continued rains will continue so longer than usual.

The telephone line from Starkey to Sheep Ranch is complete, and a force will begin in a few days to extend the line to Sumpter, a distance of a little more than 30 miles. Probably a line from Hildaway Springs to Susanville, 40 miles, will be built this summer.
