Lewiston Will Pave.

Lewiston, Idaho, June 5.—The matter of material to be used in paving the business streets of the city of Lewiston came up before the city council for final decision at the last meeting, and resulted in the selection of treated wood blocks. The contract will involve the paving of Main street from the river to Thirteenth street, and other streets in the business district. Fifty-five thousand yards of blocks will be used, and the cost will be over \$200,000. This paving contract will be the largest awarded by any of the northwest cities this year, except North Yakima which is putting in 70,000 yards of brick.
