SHAKE UP IN PENDLETON

Pendleton, June 9.—A shake-up in the Pendleton team will be made by Manager Lorimer during the next few days and a winning aggregation secured. Several notorious weaknesses in the local nine, known to the manager and fans generally, will be strengthened by the installation of new men.

Efforts will be made to turn out a team that will be a pennant winner. This means a good deal of improvement since La Grande's lead on the flag is big.

During the early part of the season lack of funds served as a handicap to the backers of the locals. Several of the players have been kept merely on sufferance because cash was not on hand to get better men. These will be given their releases and new and better men gotten.

Emerick of Baker, Isaacs of Payette, Idaho, and Crocker of Spokane are among the likely candidates for honors with the Pendleton team.

The schedule of new plans was devised as soon as it was seen from the canvass of the city by the subscription committee that the money needed for the support of a first-class team would be forthcoming. With several hundred dollars in cash and promises of more secured on the first trip of the committee, Manager Lorimer was assured by them that the necessary changes in the team might be made with safety.

WOODMEN TO PEORIA

The Oregon delegation to the head camp of the Modern Woodmen of America at Peoria, Ill., is now on its way. The last of the delegates to join the representation was Fred B. Currey, junior editor of The Observer, who became a part of the delegation this morning, when No. 6 arrived in the city. In the party are four delegates and State Deputy J. W. Simmons. Prominent Millionaire Dead.

Hemstead, L. I., June 10.—Oliver H. P. Belmont died of appendicitis and peritonitis in his country home at 6:40 this morning. Hope for his recovery was abandoned last night, when members of the family remained at his bedside. Belmont was a prominent member of a family of millionaires, of wide financial interests, and one of the leading New York financiers. He gave much time to sports, and was the owner of fine race horses. He was stricken suddenly with acute developments of a disease which is supposed to have been of long standing.

High Financier Dead.

Los Angeles, June 10.—Judson C. Brusie, secretary of the state board of railroad commissioners, who was arrested here Sunday charged with embezzlement of funds belonging to the Metropolitan Bonding & Surety company, of which he was the San Francisco representative, died this morning in the Cala hospital, where he was taken last night following his release on bonds.
