NOTABLE CASE FILED HERE

A case was filed in the circuit court which has considerable distinction in that it is the first case in Oregon to come under the new interstate commerce law passed by congress. The suit involves the question of rates from Portland, Col., to this city, and the principals in it are the O. R. & N., by Claude Johns, attorney for the company, and O. F. Coolidge. The litigation is to recover the difference between 35 and 60 cents per 100 on a shipment of cement to this place. Mr. Coolidge paid his freight bill at the rate of 35 cents per hundred and the new laws of the commerce department establishes a rate of 60 cents.

Treat Will Speak.
