For a while after that it was a pitcher's battle pure and simple. Occasionally when things got passed these two men, La Grande players did the rest. This cannot be said of the visitors, for the errors came in bunches and in singles, and then they calculated how they could do it otherwise. Walla Walla made its last two in the sixth. La Grande got one more in the seventh and two them in the eighth.

Dabell Brown with a friendly smile when the latter appeared in the court room. Brown, who is a former manager of the bank, has been doing his best to send Barnett to prison. That incident caused a ripple of surprise in the room.

C. H. Dunsmeier, former state bank examiner, was cross-examined by Attorney Geary for Barnett as to the conversation with the defendant's cousin, in which he was given to understand that the Colton securities burned in the fire.

## THREE GAMES FOR LOCALS

### THIRD GAME GOES TO LA GRANDE, 7 TO 4.

Loosely Played Game on Visitors' Part Slightly Mays an Otherwise Good Game—Pitchers' Battle for the Most Part—Unassisted Double and a Home Run Are Features of the Game.

The largest crowd that has yet passed through the portals of the Athletic park, yesterday afternoon saw La Grande take the third straight game from the Walla Wallans in a game somewhat loosely played on the part of Walla Walla, but offset in part by the skillful twirling of Anderson, occupant of the box for the visitors.

That den Svenske can "throw" was demonstrated in the opening game when the flaxen-haired youth from the fjords of rustic Sweden exhibited in that department. Yesterday his poor support allowed La Grande to score frequently. But all honors are not due Anderson; study the statistics table and see what Cotteman did. Once, twice Cotteman picked up a duster in the first inning and threw the batters out at first. Though Lodell was in hospital, still the initial station under the agency of Beck, was properly cared for.

The third visitor went by way of the rear entrance when Fuchel pulled down the duster to left garden. Nothing happened for La Grande either, this trip. Number two was a fizzle as far as Walla Walla was concerned, but that going clanged three times when the canton was eventually retired. Beck was thrown out, while Fournier binged a safe one, on which he soon bled to second on steal. Van Horst popped up to McAllister. Houston got to first on the first bad fumble Walla Walla made. Childers got to first without a hit. Errors came so fast that Fournier and Houston had no trouble in knocking the dust off the home pan, while Childers soon had easy meat
