UNCLE SAM TO TAKE PART

Seattle, June 17. (Special correspondence.)—Now that the United States government has made a \$600,000 appropriation for participation in the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition, the work creating the 1909 fair has been given an impetus. While there has never been any doubt in the minds of the management as to the success of the exposition, and as to its being ready on time, the government's action has stimulated more interest in the fair throughout the country.

During the past week applications for concessions and exhibit space have been pouring into the offices in the administration building. The construction work has gone ahead without any cessation, and there are finished buildings.

The government architects are now working on the plans for Uncle Sam's buildings, and just as soon as the designs are finished, construction will be started. Of the total appropriation \$250,000 will be spent in the buildings. Besides the main government building there will be structures for Hawaii, Alaska, the Philippines and the fisheries industry. The remaining \$350,000 will be expended for exhibits as follows: Government, \$200,000; Alaska, \$100,000; Hawaii, \$25,000; Philippines, \$15,000.

The Gobblers' team of this city has arranged a ball game with the strong Elgin team for next Sunday afternoon, and on that date the local lodge team will make its second appearance in baseball suits since it was organized. It has improved materially since its opening game with Union, and the followers of the team look for a sure victory.

The club professionals will be away from home on that day, and baseball fans will be given a taste of amateur ball on that date. The admission will be 25 cents anywhere on the grounds.

CITED TO APPEAR.

Umatilla County Men Must Be in Portland June 22.

Pendleton, June 16.—Col. J. H. Raley and the other Umatilla county men recently indicted for conspiracy to defraud the government of Indian lands, have been notified to appear before the federal court in Portland, June 22, for arraignment.

Though any who wish may be given a trial at that time, it is not probable that any of the Umatilla county cases will come up for trial before the next term of court. The usual demurrers to the indictments and other dilatory tactics will be observed.
