PAPER BERRY BOXES

Milwaukie has the unique distinction of being the only city in the northwest with a paper berry box factory, says a Portland paper. This is the property of J. W. Grasse & Son. As far as is known this is the first time such a berry box has ever made its appearance. Eight people are employed in the factory, which turns out 35,000 boxes daily and is unable to meet the demand now made by growers. With the installation of additional machinery next week and the employment of more helpers, Mr. Grasse expects to be able to produce 50,000 berry boxes daily.

All of the present output is finding ready sale around Milwaukie. The box is sold at a slightly cheaper price than the tin-top wooden berry box and is much more durable. It may be filled a dozen times without impairing its usefulness, while the ordinary box breaks up after being used once or twice.

Howard Grasse has a patent on the smaller box manufactured by the company. The large square box is not patented by Grasse, but as far as is known this is the first appearance of this box in the northwest. The smaller boxes are made of one piece of heavy brown cardboard, and the larger of two pieces. The inside of the box is treated with paraffine, making it impervious to moisture and increasing the life of the box almost indefinitely. Mr. Grasse hopes to make the Milwaukie factory a northwest distributing point for the boxes.

SUCCESSOR FOR SATTERLEE.

Another Attempt to Elect Successor to the Late Episcopal Bishop. Washington, June 17.—Another attempt to elect a successor to the late Henry Y. Satterlee, as bishop of Washington, will be made by the diocesan convention of the Protestant Episcopal church, which convened today. Bishop Brent, of the Philippines, was elected to the bishopric last month, but declined the honor. The office is one of the highest and most important in the gift of the American church. Among those whose names probably will be presented for the office are the Rev. Dr. William H. Groscone, rector of the Church of the Incarnation, New York City; the Rev. Dr. Alexander Mann, rector of Trinity church, Boston; the Rev. Dr. W. T. Manning, rector of Trinity church, New York; the Rev. Dr. Edwin M. Jeffers, of Philadelphia; the Rev. Dr. Beverly Warner, rector of Trinity church, New Orleans; Bishop Kinsolving, of Brazil, and Bishop Ortswold of Salina, Kan.
