Horrible Accident—Hood River.
A frightful accident occurred at the Stanley-Smith mill at Grand Rapids Monday morning at 7:45. Ed Johnson, an employe of the mill, fell the victim of a horrible death.
It appears that edging about the size of a 2x4 caught in the saw in some manner and was kicked back and passed through the head of the unfortunate man.
Mr. Johnson lived until 1 p. m. The body was taken to the Nichols' undertaking parlors and an inquest was held yesterday evening. Mr. Nichols stated that the body would be retained for a time with the hope of locating some of his relatives. It has been stated that he has two brothers residing somewhere in the state of New York. He is a man 5 feet 7 inches high; full face, auburn hair and mustache; short chin and stoutly built. The coroner from The Dalles was called Tuesday but the inquest was held too late for publication.
Those who saw the accident state that it was one of those unavoidable circumstances that no one could guard against, and that the company was in no way to blame.—Hood River News-Letter.
