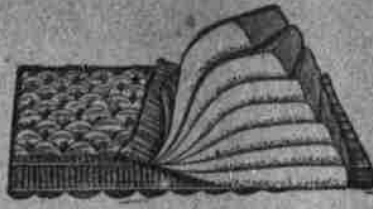

INJUNCTION IS STILL UNSETTLED

ing the temporary deputies to do the work. The plaintiff's attorneys exerted every energy to bring proof by argument and citation to precedent, that it was mandatory for the sheriff to do so.

District Attorney Ivanhoe was no less brilliant in his arguments in this case. He brought forth a logical line of argument in defense of the sheriff's action prior to the election.

At 2:45 Ivanhoe closed his arguments on the last and vital point at issue. Attorney Samu's, White of Baker City, then picked up the thread of the argument as presented in the opening plea by the complainant defendants, holding that the notices of election were mandatory and that the manner of posting is likewise mandatory. The argument set up by the defense was just the opposite of this, denying that the manner of posting must be classed as stated by the complainant.

At 4:25 the last word in the injunction trial was spoken and Circuit Judge Crawford announced that he would take the vital question under advisement, and hand down a decision as quickly as possible.

The court leaves tonight for Wallowa county and it is believed that no decision will be given until Monday morning, June 29, at which time the court again sits.
