The Rinehart family, holding their annual reunion at the Harvey Rinehart home near Summerville, are having a great time. Wednesday noon there arrived 66 members of the family. Thursday 10 more, and today there are expected a few who could not get away from business sooner. The prevailing cold has necessitated the building of campfires, but these, together with a large fireplace in the house, have been the scenes of many congenial and happy gatherings. Three cooks, with an overseer, have prepared eatables for the crowd, and that none of the family are dyspeptic is proven by the amount of food that has disappeared. Half a beef daily is the usual allowance, with beans and brown bread, vegetables, fruit and pastry in proportion. But not all the time has been spent in eating. There are other ways of enjoying one's self. While the older members of the family are recalling incidents of the early days, and mayhap dreaming of the past, the younger folks are talking, planning and dreaming of the days to come.

L. B. Rinehart entertained the gathering Thursday evening with reminiscences of early days in Grande Ronde.

Today and Sunday are visitors' days. The Rineharts welcome all. The program today promises to be very enjoyable. The address of welcome will be given by T. A. Rinehart. Prof. Frank E. Edwards of the Polytechnic school at San Luis Obispo, Cal., will respond. The orator of the day is Fred Edwards, of Mayville, Ore. His subject is "Pioneers of Oregon." Besides the speaking there will be lots of recitations, songs, etc., and Miss Wilkins of Eugene, will read an original poem. At 2 p. m. today the Rinehart nine will play the Summerville team on the Summerville grounds.

Church services will be conducted tomorrow at 10 a. m. by Rev. Bleakney of Pendleton. In the afternoon the assembled family will go to the cemetery at Summerville and decorate the graves of departed Rineharts.

Well Known Character Dead.

Jack Brown, the hide dealer, and a familiar character in Pendleton for 15 or 20 years, dropped dead on the street last evening about 8 o'clock, and the body is now at the Rader undertaking parlors, where funeral services will be held tomorrow.

Though the deceased was widely known as Jack Brown, his real name was Adam Parr and his relatives live in Baltimore. He took the name of Brown when he came west when a young man, but his exact reasons for so doing are not known.

The immediate cause of his death is thought to have been an injury to his chest which he received about two months ago. A rib was broken at that time and was not properly attended to. It has pained him greatly since then and yesterday he hurt it again, and as this is in the region of his heart, it is believed to have caused his death.—Pendleton East Oregonian.
