BAKER CITY WINS AT MINING TOWN SUNDAY

The tabulation of games won and lost by clubs of the Inland Empire league reveals no change in the standing, except that Pendleton is no nearer second place than it was yesterday morning and that Baker City is outrun nearer the top of the cellar. Baker City won the first game of the Pendleton-Baker City series at Baker City yesterday, the day previous being too wet to play. By the close score of 3 to 4, the Miners took Pendleton down in a splendid game that had no particular features other than clean, straight baseball.

Elgin-Wallowa. Elgin, June 22.—Two of the best games ever played on an eastern Oregon diamond were witnessed by the fans here yesterday. The forenoon game was a plain hummer. Up to the last half of the ninth the score stood 2 to 1 in Wallowa's favor. Each inning was just simply one, two three and out to the field. In the last half of the ninth, when Elgin was at bat, two men down and a runner on second, a drive was sent out straight over second, seemingly too high for any one to stop, but Marvin, playing the base for Wallowa, brought it down and prevented a tie.

The afternoon game belonged to Elgin from the start, but Wallowa rooters could not believe it, and backed their faith in the boys from home to the extent of about \$300. The afternoon score was 5 to 1.

NEW SYSTEM OF BOOK KEEPING

TO KEEP RECORDS DIFFERENTLY AFTER JULY 1

Register Will Have But One Book—He Now Must Keep Several—All Documents Will Be Numbered Serially—Register Will Issue Receipt as Soon as Money is Received—Alphabetical List of All Applicants Etc., Kept.

Beginning July 1, all district land offices will begin their work with a entirely new system of bookkeeping the salient features of which are outlined below.

The register will have one book for all accounts for whatever nature. There will be only one series of numbers for all papers, and the first paper filed the morning of July 1 being numbered 01. The next paper, no matter of what kind, will be numbered 02. Every paper filed in regard to a case will have the same number as the initial paper of the case. All pending entries, when they first appear in the district office, will receive the current number.

An alphabetical list of all applicants declarants, entrymen, etc., will be kept both in the district and general land offices. The card index system will be used for this.

Uniform receipt blanks will be furnished from the general office for the use of registers. These will be serially numbered, one series for all registers, before they are sent out, and registers will be held strictly accountable for each one.

Registers will issue receipts for all moneys received at the time the money is tendered. A press copy of each receipt must be taken before it is issued.

This order is the result of the work of the commission appointed some months ago to report on the system of keeping public accounts. In September of last year a considerable change in the then system of keeping the land office books was made, but this latest order supercedes every previous order of any kind whatsoever. Until all pending cases are numbered, the registers will have to work days, nights—figuratively speaking—and as Mr. Bramwell of the local office, says, "Sundays, too." But after the system is in good running order, and pending cases have been properly catalogued, the work will be much simpler and easier than it is now.
