HORRIBLE REIGN OF DESTRUCTION

TEHERAN OUTRAGES ARE CONTINUED UNABATED TODAY

Women and Children Dragged From Bed, Tortured and Finally Killed—None of the Foreign Legations Have Been Threatened as Yet—Horrors of Yesterday Continued Today Even More Fiercely—Sultan's Troops in Full Control.

London, June 24.—Advices from Teheran today state the conditions in the Persian capital are worse than they were yesterday. Pillaging, fighting and looting by the shah's troops continue. Some of the streets are completely blocked with dead, houses wrecked and a large portion of the city in ruins.

Women and children were dragged from their beds early this morning by drunken soldiers, who tortured them for amusement until they begged to be killed. There is no one on the streets today but Cossacks.

So far the legations of foreign nations have not been threatened. It is understood the shah has given strict orders that no foreigners be killed.

Dispatches from the frontier say the czar is mobilizing troops to be in readiness to move on Persia at any moment. British and Russian consuls have demanded the shah to release all political prisoners and restore order as soon as possible.

Sons of Veterans.

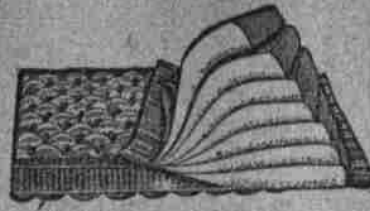
Washington, June 24.—Sons of Veterans of Maryland and the District of Columbia began their annual convention in this city today.
