North-Shah in Complete Control of City and Has Ordered Wholesale Slaughter of Leaders and Participants in the Riots of Yesterday-Blood Flows Freely-Prisoners Arc Killed Without Trial.

Teheran, Persia, June 25.—The shah

The shah's troops began arresting early today, and in the mans cases leaders of Ahnjumans and other political clubs were shot down without trials. THE THAMES TOO ROUGH TO PERMIT SCHEDULED RACE.

Great Festivities in New London Today-Harvard and Yale Break Even in the Junior Events by Harvard Taking the Freshmen Eight-Oared and Yale the 'Varsity Four-Oared Events-Real Race of the Day Takes Place This Evening.

New London, June 25 .- Because the hames was kicked up by a sharp wind this afternoon, the scheduled eight-oared 'varsity boat race between Harvard and Yale, which has attracted people from far and near and has assembled many notables of the nation, was postponed until late in the

Early Honors Divided.

New London, June 25 .- Harvard and Yale divided bonors in the pretiminary races, the blue winning the varsity four-oared, and the crimson arrying away the honors in the freshmen eights. This division gave new interest in the big eight-oared contest of the afternoon. In the fourpared race Yale got off in the lead by half a length; at the end of the two mile course she was a length ahead. Official time: 10 minutes, 33 seconds; Harvard, 10 minutes, 43 seconds.

Determined to retrieve the day for the crimson, Harvard got off with a terrific stroke, winning by two and a half lengths. Time: Harvard, 9 minutes, 38 seconds; Yale, 9 minutes, 47

The 'varsity four-oar race and freshmen eights are scheduled this morning. The Yale eight s the favorite and a number of big bets are recorded today, 10 to 9 and 5 to 4 on Yale.
