**FIRE BLIGHT PREVENTIVE**

"Of all the troubles affecting the pear and apple, whether due to insect or fungi, there are probably none which equals in severity the fire blight," writes County Fruit Inspector Huffman.

"Blight is very easily told. Examine the trees carefully, and you will see the ends of the limbs or leaves withering and turning black, the leaves still clinging to the dead boughs; and if the limb is cut where diseased a dark, sticky substance will exude, often running down the side of the limb or tree, thus affecting the part and spreading the disease. Birds or insects alighting on the same carry it to other trees and thus the farther spread of the disease.

"As blight works in the sap it is hard to reach by spraying. So the most effective remedy is to cut out all affected parts well below any signs of the disease, and wash the cuts with strong solution of blue stone and water. Also disinfect knives, saw, etc., by thoroughly washing in same solution.

"Be sure to burn all parts cut off to prevent further spread of the disease."

**MAURICE OWNS PAPER.**

Well Known Would-Be Frencher Has "Hunch" to Push the Pencil.

Maurice O. Fitzmaurice, the itinerant lecturer who established a temporary abode in Pendleton some time ago, has embarked in the newspaper business in the state of Washington. It will be remembered that when Mr. Fitzmaurice, with his breezy familiarity, blew into Pendleton, he was a candidate for the bar examination, but owing to certain unforeseen contingencies over which he had no control, Mr. Fitzmaurice withdrew at the last minute.

His unfortunate experience before the bar suggesting by antithesis the comparatively untiled fields of arid prohibition, Mr. Fitzmaurice harbored the intention for a time of starting a temperance newspaper in Pendleton. He confided his plan to several newspaper men of Walla Walla, whom he intended possibly to shanghai for his new sheet.

That Mr. Fitzmaurice's newspaper ambitions did not fade at the time when he made his ingrowing debut is shown by a recent report from Pomeroy.

He left Pendleton some time ago, immediately following his return from Walla Walla, where he became mixed up in the Barnes case, and had not been heard of for some time. Before coming here he was a lecturer and had been traveling through eastern Oregon. The following dispatch from Pomeroy, Wash., tells of Mr. Fitzmaurice's present business and intentions:

**ADVERTISING FOR FEDERAL BUILDING SITES.**

Treasury Department, Office of the Secretary, Washington, D. C., June 8, 1908.

Proposals will be received, to be opened at 3 o'clock p. m., July 16, 1908, for the sale or donation to the United States of a suitable site, centrally and conveniently located, for the federal building to be erected in La Grande, Oregon. A corner lot, of (approximately) 120x125 feet, is required. Each proposal must give the price, the character of foundations obtainable, the proximity to street cars, sewer, gas and water mains, etc., and must be accompanied by a diagram indicating the principal street, the north point, the dimensions and grades of the land, the widths and paving of adjacent streets and alleys, whether the alleys are public or private, and whether or not the city owns land occupied by sidewalks. The vendor must pay all expenses connected with furnishing evidences of title and deeds of conveyance. Improvements on the property must be reserved by the vendor; but pending the commencement of the federal building they may remain on the land upon payment of a reasonable ground rent. The grantor must, however, remove all improvements on thirty days' notice so to do. The right to reject any proposal is reserved. Each proposal must be sealed, marked "Proposal for federal building site at La Grande, Oregon," and mailed to the secretary of the treasury, (supervising architect), Washington, D. C. No special form of proposal is required or provided.
