**TWO SERIES IN FRED TAYLOR LA GRANDE SICK AGAIN**

When Grant Lincoln was in Pendleton yesterday afternoon, en route home with his victorious bunch from Walla Walla, he made arrangements for a double-headed series in this city to commence today and continue until July 5, with one or two open days. This means that professional ball will be seen in this city on the Fourth and during the other days of festivities that precede the national holiday.

**Began Today.**  
The first series began today at the ball park with Pendleton, the visiting team arriving on the morning train from Baker City, where they played the last game of the series yesterday. For four successive days the team will battle with the Pendletonians on the grounds at the local park. One day of rest follows the series, and the day after that, the 30th, the two teams play an exhibition game here. Then, after another day of rest, the next series, which under ordinary circumstances would have been played at Pendleton, begins in the local park. It, too, will be a four-game series. This will give La Grande fans nine games of fast ball, between the two leaders in the pennant race. Pendleton has never been on the home grounds since the regular schedule was arranged, and much interest centers on the outcome of the double-header series.

**Arrange New Schedule.**  
By Baker being out of condition, and the electric line to the Walla Walla ball park unfinished, the regular schedule was knocked away recently. As a result there will be a new schedule drawn up in a few days that will govern the games after the present irregularity.

J. R. Rollin bought an isolated tract of 120 acres. Mr. Rollin lives in the Gardane country in Umatilla county.

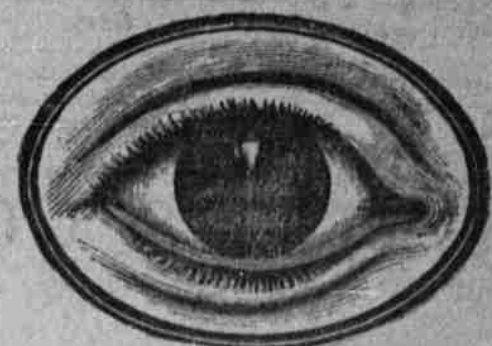
Mark S. Robinson of Milton, bought an isolated 30 acre tract.
